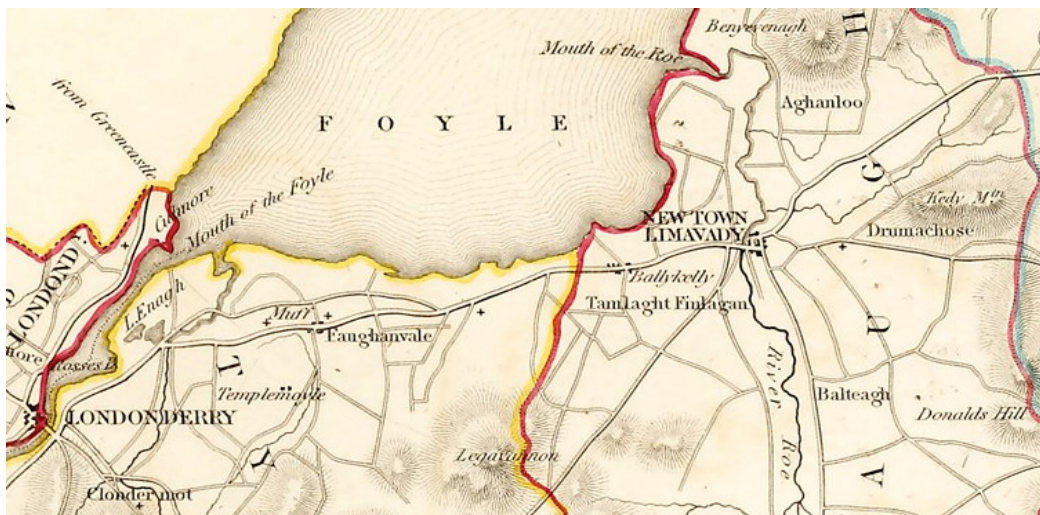

Annie Kinkaid of Ballykelly, Tamlaght Finlagan Parish, County Londonderry (c1775 - 1815).

- **Discussion:** The following two biographies relate to two children of Robert W. Cowan (1800 - c1867) and Hannah Limerick; namely George Limerick Cowan and Hadessa Cowan, wife of James Clayton. The first shows that Robert W. Cowan was from Ballykelly, County Londonderry. The second article shows that Robert W. Cowan was the son of Robert Cowan and Leah Wilson and that Hannah Limerick was the

daughter of George Limerick and **Annie Kinkaid**. Furthermore, in the second article, Hannah Limerick and Robert W. Cowan were both said to have been born near Londonderry and Hannah age of 64 while Robert lived to the age of 67. The Claytons settled at Murfreesboro, Tennessee while the Cowans in Nashville, Tennessee then Shelbyville, Bedford County, Tennessee. Following the articles are records which support the biographies.

- **George Limerick Cowan**, of Franklin Tenn., was born twenty miles from Londonderry, at Bally Kelly, County Derry, Ireland, Oct. 15, 1842. His father, **Robert W. Cowan**, was born in 1800, in the same place, was a farmer and one of the few who owned land. His wife was **Hannah Limerick**, also a native of Ireland. In 1851 they came to the United States and settled at Shelbyville, Bedford county, Tenn., where he bought a grist-mill, which he conducted in connection with his farm. In 1858 he sold the mill and devoted his attention to farming exclusively. He was known as the original secessionist of Bedford county and was very active in the service. Both he and his wife lived to be nearly three score and ten years old. They had ten children, all but one of them still living. George L. received his education in the common schools, and in July, 1859, he engaged in the wholesale dry goods business at Nashville, in which he was engaged at the breaking out of the war. He assisted Capt. Montgomery Little to raise a company which was sworn into the Confederate service as an escort company for Gen. N. B. Forrest. At the end of a year Mr. Cowan was elected orderly sergeant, later was promoted to third lieutenant, then second lieutenant, and as such had command of the company at the time of the final surrender at Gainesville, Ala., May 10, 1865. He took part in all of the engagements in which Forrest's command had a part until the close. Returning to Shelbyville, he put in a crop on the home place, and later attended school for six months. In 1866 he associated himself with a wholesale house in Nashville and remained there for three years, when he organized a company known as Kinkade, Hanley & Co., wholesale druggists, with which firm he remained until 1877. He then became a leading spirit in the firm of Cowan & Co., wholesale notions, but disposed of this interests in this house in 1887 and removed to his farm near Franklin. He was married Jan. 3, 1884, to Miss Hattie McGavock, daughter of Col. and Mrs. John McGavock. After his marriage he erected a neat cottage on their place, a part of the McGavock farm, and this has since been their home. Five children have been born to them, three boys and two girls. Mr. Cowan carried on general farming and stock raising, being quite an extensive breeder of high class roadsters. He is one of the trustees of the Confederate Cemetery Company for twelve years; has been secretary of the Bicouac of Confederate soldiers; is a member of Hiram lodge No. 7, Free and Accepted Masons; has held all the chairs in that lodge; was delegate to the Grand Lodge for twenty years; has held every chair in Franklin chapter; is now grand king of the Grand chapter of the state; a member of Orestes lodge No. 10. Knights of Pythias. In politics he is a Democrat and has always been chairman of the county executive committee in 1892-93. Of Scotch-Irish descent, he finds the Presbyterian church his natural home and has been an elder of that church for forty years. For fifteen years he has been superintendent of the Sunday school. Mr. Cowan was engaged in the insurance business in Franklin for seven years. He is an expert accountant and does a great deal of that kind of work. The family home is one mile south of Franklin, and is a very pretty and attractive place [Allison, John. Notable men of Tennessee: Personal and genealogical, with portraits. Atlanta, GA: Southern Historical Association, 1905. p. 138-139].

- James Clayton joined Captain Lowe's Company, Twenty-third Regiment of Tennessee Volunteers, October 5, 1861, at Murfreesboro, Tennessee, was appointed quartermaster sergeant at once, was put on duty as acting quartermaster as soon as General Cleburne's Brigade was formed, and was commissioned captain and quartermaster in 1862. Early in 1865 he was commissioned major and quartermaster and was put on the staff of General McComb, and with his command surrendered to General Grant at Appomattox Courthouse in 1865. At the age of thirty-five years Mr. Clayton married **Hadassah Cowan**. She was born near Londonderry, County Derry, Ireland, where was also born her father, **Robert Cowan, Jr.**, and where her grandparents, **Robert and Leah (Wilson) Cowan**, who were of Scotch lineage, spent all their lives. **Robert Cowan, Jr.**, was reared as a farmer and engaged in that pursuit in his native land. About 1850, accompanied by his wife and nine of their ten children, he embarked on board a sailing vessel for America, and after a tedious voyage of six weeks and four days landed in New Orleans. From there he came by way of the Mississippi, Ohio and the Cumberland Rivers to Nashville, Tennessee, and thence by omnibus to

Shelbyville. Purchasing a grist mill and a saw mill he operated them for two years, and then bought a farm two miles out from Shelbyville, where his energies were employed in tilling the soil until his death at the age of sixty-seven. They maiden name of the wife of Mr. Cowan was **Hannah Limerick**. She was born near Londonderry, County Derry, Ireland, a daughter of George and Annie (Kinkaid) Limerick, and died in Tennessee when sixty-four years of age. She was a woman of much force of character, and reared her ten children to habits of industry and honesty. The Kinkaid and Cowan families were Presbyterians and brought their children up in the same religious faith. Mr. and Mrs. Clayton became the parents of eight children, namely: Emma, James, Margaret, John, Jennie, Robert, George C. and Mary. The son James married Lida Keeble, and they have three children, James, Horave and Annie. Margaret is the wife of Henry Luck and has one child, Susan Luck. John married Rebecca O'Neal. Mr. and Mrs. Clayton for many years, until the recent death of Mr. Clayton, worshipped together as members of the Presbyterian faith [Hale, Will Thomas & Dixon Lanier Merritt. A History of Tennessee and Tennesseans: The Leaders and Representative Men in Commerce, Industry and Modern Activities. Chicago: The Lewis Publishing Company, 1913. page 2078].

- **Discussion:** The following 1870 census record indicates that Hannah (Limerick) Cowan was born about 1805. As she is said to have lived to the age of 64, she must have died soon after this census. Her daughter **Nannie Cowan** later married **Samuel Kinkade**, son of James Kinkead of Ballykelly.

Discussion: Bob (jrn2217@Aol.com) posted on Worldconnect that **Hadassah (Cowan) Clayton** was born in Londonderry on 17 November 1841 and died in Rutherford County, Tennessee on 14 August 1930.

Discussion: The above information supports the notion that Hannah (Limerick) Cowan's parents were the following George and Ann Limerick of Ballykelly.

Full Abstract : Letters of Administration (with the Will annexed) of the personal estate of **George Limerick late of Ballykelly** County Londonderry Farmer deceased who died 18 February 1865 at same place were granted at Londonderry to John Limerick of Ballykelly aforesaid Farmer the Residuary Legatee.

Peter Kincaid's tidbits from Will images: **George Limerick of Ballykelly** died on 18 February 1865. By his Will, dated 29 May 1860, he leaves his two farms of land in the townlands of Drumaconey and Ballykelly, to his **son Samuel Limrick** and the young man named John Limrick "who has been reared and educated by my **sister Nancy** and who now resides in my own dwelling house and in part manages my farms and has been adopted by me" jointly during the lifetime of Samuel and then to said John. Executor **friend John Kinkead**. Will witnessed by Geo Proctor and Robert Proctor. [Public Record Office of Northern Ireland.

Full Abstract : The Will of **Nancy Limerick late of Ballykelly** in the County of Londonderry Spinster deceased who died 5 February 1866 at same place was proved at Londonderry by the oath of John Limerick of Ballykelly aforesaid Grocer the sole Executor.

Peter Kincaid's tidbits from Will images: **Nancy Limerick of Ballykelly**, spinster, died on 5 February 1866. By her Will, dated 6 February 1866, she leaves all property to **John Limerick, son of her nephew Samuel Limerick** subject to legacies. Bequests to **brother Thomas**, Letitia Murry, widow of Thomas Murry; Letitia's daughter Nancy Murry; **niece Margaret Moore, wife of William Moore** now in America. Executor said John Limerick. Will witnessed by William Wilson, Solicitor Newtownlimavady and **John Kinkead**.

- The Civil Registration of Death records that **Margaret Kinkade Limerick**, a 30 year old spinster farmer's daughter, died at Ballykelly, Tamlaght Finlagan parish, of tubercular phthisis 7 months. The informant was **her father John Limerick** of Ballykelly, Tamlaght Finlagan parish who was present at death [Ireland. Civil Registrations of Deaths. Ballykelly, Limivady District, no. 498, volume __, page 404; registered on 23 September 1903.

- The records for Ballykelly Presbyterian Church cemetery, Tamlaght Finlagan Parish has a **Margaret Kinkead** who died 14 Aug 1903 and is buried in plot Number D066.

The death of **Margaret Kinkade**, age 30, was recorded in Limavady District in 1903 [General Index, Deaths Registered in Ireland during the Quarter ended 30 September, 1903, A to Y. Dublin: printed by Alexander Thom for Her Majestys Stationery Office, 1904. LDS Film #0101602. Limavady District, volume 1, page 404].

James Kinkead of Ballykelly, Tamlaght Finlagan Parish, County Londonderry (bef 1787 - 3 May 1836).

- **Discussion:** James Kinkead's wife was named Margaret according to cemetery records which state that she died on 8 April 1827. Son Samuel was born about 1827 so it may have been childbirth related. His apparent oldest son John Kinkead of Broharris was born about 1805. This suggests that James Kinkead of Ballykelly was at least born before 1787 if 18 when he became a father.
- The *Ballykelly Presbyterian Church* baptism registers records **James Kincaid, Ballykelly**, having a daughter, named **Ann**, born 10 March 1814 and baptised 20 March 1814 [Baptisms in the Ballykelly Presbyterian Church, Ballykelly (Book 2: 1804-1819) as abstracted by Robert Forrest of 14 Edenvale, Crossgar, Downpatrick, Northern Ireland, BT309PU (bobbyforrest63@hotmail.com) and forwarded to Peter A. Kincaid by email dated 10 June 2009].
- The Vestry Minutes for the Church of Ireland, Tamlaght Finlagan Parish has **James Kincaid** as a church warden on 23 April 1821 [Public Record Office of Northern Ireland. MIC/1/38. Church of Ireland, Tamlaght Finlagan Parish (Derry Diocese). Abstracted for Peter A. Kincaid and forwarded by email dated 23 October 2000 by Sharon Davison of 8 Silverstream Park, Bangor, Co. Down, BT20 3LU, Northern Ireland, UK (sharzy@utvinternet.com)].
 - **Discussion:** It is possible he attended the Church of Ireland due to restrictions on Dissenting religions like the Presbyterians. Census records 10 years later have all Kincaids in the area as Presbyterians.
- About 1824, **James Kinkead** is recorded as paying for seats/stipends in the west isle of Ballykelly Presbyterian Church [Records of Ballykelly Presbyterian Church, Ballykelly as abstracted by Robert Forrest of 14 Edenvale, Crossgar, Downpatrick, Northern Ireland, BT309PU (bobbyforrest63@hotmail.com) and forwarded to Peter A. Kincaid by email dated 10 June 2009].
- About 1824, **James Kinkead** gave 7s. 6d. to the dinner fund at Ballykelly Presbyterian Church [Records of Ballykelly Presbyterian Church, Ballykelly as abstracted by Robert Forrest of 14 Edenvale, Crossgar, Downpatrick, Northern Ireland, BT309PU (bobbyforrest63@hotmail.com) and forwarded to Peter A. Kincaid by email dated 10 June 2009]
- In 1824, **James Kinkead** paid to the Ballykelly Presbyterian Church £9 1s. 5p. [Records of Ballykelly Presbyterian Church, Ballykelly as abstracted by Robert Forrest of 14 Edenvale, Crossgar, Downpatrick, Northern Ireland, BT309PU (bobbyforrest63@hotmail.com) and forwarded to Peter A. Kincaid by email dated 10 June 2009].

- The *Tithe Composition Applotment Books* for Tamlaght Finlagan Parish, County Derry taken on 20 September 1827 has a **James Kinkead**, in Ballykelly Townland with 2 acres 2 roods 15 perches of arable land valued at £1/2/0 and 1 acre 2 roods 32 perches of arable land valued £3/2/11. In total the lands were valued at £4/4/11 with the tithe payable being £0/7/9 [PANB. MC2081. Tithe Applotment Books.

Tamlaght Finlagan Parish, County Derry. 5A/253/1. p. 4-5, microfilm no. 21626].

The *Tithe Composition Applottement Books* for Tamlaght Finlagan Parish, County Derry taken on 20 September 1827 has a **James Kinkead**, in Walworth Townland with 11 acres 0 roods 17 perches of arable land valued at £16/13/2 and 4 acre 2 roods 11 perches of marsh land valued at £3/8/6. In total the lands were valued at £20/1/81 with the tithe payable being £1/16/7 [PANB. MC2081. Tithe Applotment Books. Tamlaght Finlagan Parish, County Derry. 5A/253/1. p. 6, microfilm no. 21626].

Discussion: The Fishmonger records only note one James Kinkead so the Tithe records likely relate to the same person. This is supported by John Kinkead of Broharris' statement that his father held 18 acres of land in Ballykelly. This corresponds closely with the Ballykelly and Walworth lands tithed amounting to 19 acres 3 roods and 35 perches in total.

The surviving registers for the 1831 census of Londonderry includes:

Discussion: As noted above, the 1831 census of Ballykelly, Tamlaght Finlagan Parish shows James Kinkead with 4 other males and 3 females in his family. Thus, he may have had 4 sons and 3 daughters living with him. This would have been the extent of his family as, according to burial records, his wife died on 8 April 1827. What we know for children, based on the evidence given below, are John - born about 1805 as age 88 when died 1893; Ann - born 10 Mar 1814 as per baptism; Hannah born about 1822 as age 7 in 1829; James born 1 Jan 1825 as per baptism; Samuel born about 1827 as age 3 in 1830. John was living with his own family at the time of the 1831 census where he was in Broharris. Ann would have been 17 and the rest underage. So that's 2 boys and 2 girls accounted for leaving potentially 2 sons and a daughter unaccounted for.

"As to the query, whether some of the Farms on the Estate may not be too highly rated in proportion to others, Mr. Sampson furnished us with a List, which is annexed to this report, (See Appendix No. 7) of some few reductions which he would recommend amounting to £22.5.- per annum, as being in his opinion necessary to place the different farms on the estate on an equality with respect to rent. Five of the persons included in the List petitioned us on the subject (See Appendix No. 8.9.10.11.12.) ... Appendix ... Petitions and Memorials from these Tenants for reductions of rent, all of which are included in No. 7. ---

At a Meeting of the Elders of the Presbyterian Church at Ballykelly, lately held in the Meeting-house, in Ballykelly, the following expression of their sentiments on the subject of the system of National Education, now in operation, was unanimously agreed to (Signed by order,) **James Kinkead, Session Clerk**. Ballykelly, January 6, 1835. [Derry Journal, Londonderry, Ireland. Tuesday, 13 January 1835, page 3, column 3].

• **Discussion:** Other records contradict two of the entries in this report. Samuel John Kinkead died on 27 January 1958 and not 1858 [The Northern Constitution, Limavady, NI. 1 February 1958 (see below)]. Sarah Kinkead's Probate indicates that she died on 14 April 1894 versus 21 April 1895 (see below). However, the death of **Sarah Kinkead**, age 63, was recorded in Limavady District in 1895 for the quarter ending 30 June [General Index, Deaths Registered in Ireland during the Quarter ended 30 June, 1895, A to Y. Dublin: printed by Alexander Thom for Her Majestys Stationery Office, 1895. LDS Film #0101598. Limavady District, volume 1, page 528].

• **Discussion:** George Noel Kincaid's brother-in-law checked the Church of Ireland records for Ballykelly and noted that Margaret Kinkead (d. 1827) was the wife of James Kinkead (d. 1838) and that James Kinkead (d. 1867) was James Sr.'s son [Church of Ireland cemetery, Ballykelly as recorded by Allan Harron for George 'Noel' Kincaid of Belfast, Northern Ireland (george.kincade@ntlworld.com) and forwarded to Peter A. Kincaid by email dated 11 March 2007]. Allan Harron also noted that 1) Sarah Kinkead (d. 1895) was the wife of James Kinkead (d. 1867); 2) that Samuel (d. 1931), Margaret (d. 1915) and Annie (d. 1924) were siblings of each other; and 3) Samuel John Kinkead (d. 1958) was the nephew of the three siblings.

i. **John Kincaid** of Broharris townland, Tamlaght Finlagan Parish, County Londonderry (c1805 - 1893).

• **Discussion:** Up until 1831 in the 19th century, records suggest that the only Kinkead household in the Ballykelly area was that of James Kinkead of Ballykelly/Walworth. John does not appear in the Fishmonger records with a separate lease. An 1880 affidavit, see below, states that his father had 18 acres of land in Ballykelly. This fits well with the James Kinkead of Ballykelly. John states that he got his lands in Broharris from his uncle. As shown below, John Kinkead died in 1893 at the age of 88 which indicates that he was born about 1805. This would fit well as a son of James Kinkead of Ballykelly. Being old enough and with his own land he does not appear in the household of James Kinkead of Ballykelly in the 1831 census.

• **Discussion:** As noted above, the John Kincaid in the 1831 census of Broharris townland, Tamlaght Finlagan Parish had three males and 2 females in his family so he may have had two sons and at least one daughter. The oldest known child of John Kinkead of Broharris was James Kinkead (m. Mary Kerr) and he was not born until about 1840. His youngest known child, Annie Kinkead, was born about 1855. Thus, John may have had

two wives with his elder children (i.e. those born before 1840) being unknown. The Samuel Kinkead (m. Nannie Cowan) may have been one of his elder children as he was born about 1827.

- **John Kinkead** was ordained an elder of Ballykelly Presbyterian church in 1850.
- *Sir Richard Griffith's Valuation of Ireland* records John Kincaid in the 1858 valuation of Tamlaght Finlagan Parish. **John Kincaid** held property in Broharris townland at map reference 6 with a house, office and land of 25 acres, 1 rood and 10 perches all together valued at £27 15s. Furthermore, there was a **John Kincaid** in Broglasco townland who was a tenant of the Worshipful Company of Fish Mongers for land of 3 acres 3 roods and 20 perches valued at £1 15s. He did not have a house here so he was likely the John Kincaid in Broharris townland which the townland just to the southwest of Broglasco.
- The original books for the Griffith Valuation adds that the **John Kincaid** who rented land of 3 acres 3 roods and 20 perches valued at £1 15s in Broglasco townland had a lease of these lands for two years [As abstracted by Robert Forrest of 14 Edenvale, Crossgar, Downpatrick, Northern Ireland, BT309PU (bobbyforrest63@hotmail.com) and forwarded to Peter A. Kincaid by email dated 10 June 2009].
- **Discussion:** John Kinkead states that he "succeeded to his present through my uncle not being able to pay the rackrent imposed by the Company after they came into possessio." He was not listed as holding any lands in Broharris or Broglasco in the Tithe Applotment Books of 1826. However, he is recorded in the 1831 census of Broharris. Thus, he must have succeeded between these two recordings. Looking at the people in Broharris in the Tithe records and comparing them to the 1831 census, it is clear that there are only three people that could have been his uncle. These were: Mr. John Given who held 23 acres, 3 roods, and 21 perches; Solomon Rentoul who held 10 acres, 1 rood and 6 perches; and Hugh Gray who held 27 acres, 0 roods and 2 perches. Since John Kinkead came to hold 25 acres, 1 rood and 10 perches we can eliminate Solomon Rentoul as he only had 10 acres, 1 rood and 6 perches of land. While, Mr. John Given did not show up in the 1831 census of Broharris, his name appears in the Griffith Valuations as a significant holder of lands in Broharris townland - over 45 acres. This does not bode well for someone having a hard time paying the rackrents. This leaves Hugh Gray. He also held 14 acres, 1 rood and 25 perches of land in Ballyspallan townland. Hugh Gray does not appear in this townland in the 1831 census. Presumably another relative succeeded to these lands. The evidence seems to suggest that Hugh Gray is the best candidate to be John Kinkead's uncle.

Peter Kincaid's tidbits from Will images: **Nancy Limerick of Ballykelly**, spinster, died on 5 February 1866. By her Will, dated 6 February 1866, she leaves all property to **nephew John Limerick, son of her nephew Samuel Limerick** subject to legacies. Bequests to **brother Thomas**, Letitia Murry, widow of Thomas Murry; Letitia's daughter Nancy Murry; **niece Margaret Moore, wife of William Moore** now in America. Executor said John Limerick. - In the *Londonderry District Will Book, 1864-1871*, is found the Will of William Patchell of Farloe, County Londonderry dated 2 September 1864. William died 20 March 1867. In this Will, he named **John Kinkead of Broharris** as a friend and appointed him Executor of the Will.
- Petty Sessions (Ireland) Act, 1851, 14 & 15 Vict., cap. 93. (Form Ad.) Solemn Declaration.

I, **John Kinkead, of Broharris**, do solemnly and sincerely declare, that I remember my father holding about 18 acres in Ballykelly, 10 of which were under lease from the Beresfords, "middlemen holding under" the Company of Fishmongers." In 1820 the Fishmongers came into possession of the estate and compelled my father to relinquish his lease. The boundaries of the farms were then straightened, and, as a consequence, my father lost his holding, but got instead a few years after a farm in Ballyking townland, which was previously held by a man named Wright, who had to leave not being able to pay the rent.

I succeeded to my present holding through my uncle not being able to pay the rackrent imposed by the Company after they came into possession. The rent was raised from 10s. to 2l. 2s. per plantation acre. I never could have paid this rent from the resources of the farm, but did so from moneys earned at road making and boating shells for sale as manure. I reclaimed three acres of bog land on this farm without any aid from the Company. I believe all the land in this part was raised in the same rate as this farm. Of a number of tenants I remember Jack Creswell, Hamilton, Irwin, Andrew Grey, and Robert Cowan having to quit their farms owing to excessive rents, they being industrious men. Distraints for rent were very frequent.

And I make this solemn declaration conscientiously believing the same to be true, and by virtue of the provisions of an Act passed in the sixth year of the reign of his late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter sixty-two, for the Abolition of unnecessary Oaths.

- My grandfather, Samuel Kinkead, married my grandmother, Helen Kinkead nee Calder early in the 1880's, maybe earlier than 1887, and went to South Africa in the Diamond and Gold Rush of that time. My grandmother was pregnant with my mother, born 1889/1890. They were what was known as '89 Pioneers' in the very earliest days of Johannesburg, settling (ex the Kimberley Diamond Fields) in the earliest tented camp at Ferreirastown. My grandfather was a surveyer/land dealer. He made and lost fortunes in those early days and owned and dealt in the lands which form the modern center of Johannesburg. We have a few colourful stories about them, and a batch of worthless share-certificates of old gold and diamond mining syndicates. He had a reputation as a wild (and what used to be called gay) irishman. He died suddenly of influenza shortly after the end of the Boer War, leaving my grandmother with four children, my mother Vida, the eldest, Calder (Toss), Samuel Marcus and the youngest was Nora.

Calder was in fact Thompson Calder. Thompson Calder Kinkead was killed in RFC 1917. Samuel Marcus Kinkead was a famous World War One Flying Ace and later a Schnieder Trophy Pilot. He was killed in a World Speed Record attempt in 1928. After the two boys were killed, my father, at Helen Kinkead's request, changed our then family

name from Weekes to Kinkead-Weekes. My grandmother, who survived as one of the grand old dames of early Johannesburg, was a great character, died aged 97 years. She came from Perth, Scotland, daughter of a family who had stores hold the Royal Appointment (Victoria). My grandfather had a brother, John, who was out in Africa in the same early years, a surveyor/engineer employed in building the Mocambique Beira, and other African railways. He died out there of tropical fever.

Our Kinkead's, I understand were professional landconnected folk in Northern Ireland, Londonderry. Some who earlier emigrated to the United States perished in the San Francisco earthquake. A Jean Kinkead, an American Journalist (Saturday Evening Post) was said to be of this family. Another 'aunt', Margaret Kinkead, linked up with us in South Africa in the 30's and 40's but we never traced any relationships. On her death she left to me minor possessions, including a Kinkead crested silver salver relating to her family and an early relative Richard Kinkead, killed in the Indian Amtiury ?, including fascinating early 19th century correspondence, Richard, his mother and later his children. This family were Sugar Planters in Jamaica, merchants and shipowners in England. There are still Kinkead's of that family in Kingston, Jamaica, business men, solicitors etc. I've met one, an ex Rhodes Scholar.  - Mark Kinkead-Weekes obituary// English literature scholar and expert on DH Lawrence// In 1965, Mark Kinkead-Weekes, who has died aged 79, began a lectureship at the recently established University of Kent at Canterbury and enthusiastically involved himself in the development of

a highly innovative, inter-disciplinary degree structure for English studies, collaborating with teachers in history, philosophy and the foreign languages and ranging well beyond his own specialist fields. Nine years later he was appointed professor of English and American literature and began a three-year stint as pro-vice-chancellor.// His publishing career initially took a backseat to his commitment to teaching and administration, but Mark's book *Samuel Richardson: Dramatic Novelist* (1973) revealed a pitch-perfect sensitivity to the author's strengths and quickly became a standard critical work.// Unusually for an 18th-century specialist, Mark had always been interested in DH Lawrence. After publishing a pioneering essay entitled *The Marble and the Stone*, on the genesis of Lawrence's *The Rainbow* and *Women in Love*, he was asked by Cambridge University Press (CUP) to edit the first of these novels. Its multiple drafts make *The Rainbow* a particularly difficult text to handle, but the edition he published in 1989 was a triumph of meticulous scholarship and helped pave the way to his election to the British Academy in 1992.// By that time CUP had already asked him to write a biography of Lawrence. The mountain of material available made him feel that this was too big a task for one person, so he entrusted the opening and final stages of Lawrence's life to John Worthen and me, and dealt with the crucial, middle stage himself. This was a time in Lawrence's life when he was hounded by the authorities, prevented by censorship from earning his living, and had a tumultuous private life.// Using original manuscripts, Mark worked out exactly what went wrong between Katherine Mansfield, John Middleton Murry and Lawrence in 1920 after years of intense friendship. Published in 1996, Mark's volume of the biography, *DH Lawrence: Triumph to Exile 1912-22*, established him as one of the world's leading Lawrentians.// Mark was born in Pretoria, South Africa, and christened Marcus after his uncle, Samuel Marcus Kinkead, a first world war flying ace who died in 1928 trying to break the air speed record.// From Potchefstroom high school, he went on to the University of Cape Town, where he was awarded a Rhodes scholarship. A passionate opponent of any form of apartheid, he arrived in Britain to study English literature at Brasenose College, Oxford.// His first university post was in Edinburgh, where he lived for nine happy years (1956-65) and where he met his wife, Joan, before moving to the University of Kent at Canterbury. Mark published on several topics, including South African literature, and in 1967 co-wrote, with Ian Gregor, a critical study of the author William Golding. He published a much-revised edition in 2002, taking account of Golding's later works.// All Mark's writing exhibits a sharp critical intelligence, but his forte was infinitely painstaking and sympathetic exposition of an author's processes and intentions. His critical method was a reflection of his character (try as hard as he might, he found it difficult to see the bad side in anybody). It was placed on an ambulance and conveyed to the mortuary.// A few minutes later the wreckage of the super-marine Napier S5 was hauled on to a trawler, which had towed it from the spot where it was found. The machine was a mass of twisted ironwork.// A two hours' search.// Diving and dragging operations by the Government ship Excellent began at midday, and two hours later a diver reported the finding of the machine in 40 feet of water. The engine had broken away from the fuselage, but both parts of the seaplane were almost together. The fuselage and tail were hauled up to the side of the vessell. The moment it was visible it was seen that Kinkead was in the pilot's seat. His clenched hands hung over the side of the cockpit. Nothing else could be seen.// Badly mutilated. Flight-Lieutenant Kinkead's body was in a rather badly mutilated condition when it was brought ashore and conveyed to the mortuary of the Calshott Air Station, no doubt due to the force with which the airman and his machine struck the water, and it is probable that he was also dashed against the sides of the cockpit.// No further theory has yet been

advanced with regard to the cause of the tragedy, and none is likely until the official examination of the remains of the machine by Air Ministry experts to-day. The inquest will be held at the station. No arrangements for the funeral have yet been made.// The King's message of sympathy.// The King has sent the following message to Sir Samuel Hoare (Secretary of State for Air):--"I am grieved to learn of the loss sustained by the Royal Air Force in the tragic death of Flight-Lieutenant Kinkead, who had such a distinguished career in the service. I will only add that the machine and engine employed were of the same type as those which won the Schneider contest at Venice last September, and that every possible precaution is of course, and has always been, taken to reduce to a minimum the possibility of accidents in flights of this character. Robinson, M.A., who was minister of Ballykelly Presbyterian Church from 1862-1905.// Mr. Robinson remarked on the melancholy coincidence that the news of Flight-Lieut. Kinkead's death synchronised with the publication in the "Whig" yesterday of a special article on the centenary of Ballykelly Presbyterian Church and of pictures of the church, one of which showed the tablet erected to the memory of Mr. Robinson's father.// Mr. Robinson, in the course of his conversation with a "Whig" representative, stated that Lieutenant Kinkead's ancestors on his paternal side were County Derry men. He was born in the house of his grandfather at Ballykeen (where his father was also born) and was baptised by Mr. Robinson's father.// During his long residence in South Africa Mr. Robinson was well acquainted with the Kinkead family. He knew the gallant airman whose death is so much regretted in his early boyhood, and stated that he was always affectionately known as "Babs," even until the time when he joined the flying service during the war. He described Flight-Lieutenant Kinkead as always being a very calm lad, exceedingly plucky, and as hard as nails.// Flight-Lieutenant Kinkead's elder brother also joined the Air Force, but was killed while training in England preparatory to going on foreign service. His two sisters are alive, but his father died about 15 years ago. His mother was a Scotswoman.// It is worthy of note

that Mr. Robinson's brother, the Rev. Aston Robinson, B.A., Carnlough, is the special preacher at the continued centenary services in Ballykelly Church next Sunday.[The Northern Whig and Belfast Post, Belfast, Northern Ireland. Wednesday, 14 March 1928, page 7, column 3].

The Speed Tragedy// Kinkead not drowned// Possible cause of death// The inquest was held at Southampton yesterday on Flight-Lieut. Kinkead, who was killed at Calshot on Monday while attempting to create a world's speed record.// A post-mortem examination proved that Kinkead was not drowned. A specimen of blood and part of the lung have been sent for examination to discover if tetra ethyl lead or carbon monoxide were present.// It was stated that after the first flight on Sunday, Kinkead complained of being sick in the machine.// A service engineer said the spirit used contained tetra ethyl lead, special fuel for type-engine. He considered it a possibility that Kinkead was overcome by fumes spirit.// The inquest was adjourned.// Kinkead a Derryman.// The father of **Flight-Lieut. S. M. Kinkead** was at one time manager of the business establishment at the junction of Orchard Street and Bridge Street of Messrs. M'Cully & Thompson. He married a Scotchwoman, and emigrated to South Africa, where he had a prosperous career. In 1897 he and his wife paid a visit to this country from Johannesburg, and during their stay at Ballykeen, Ballykelly, the heroic young air officer was born.// The ivy covered cottage in which he first saw the light is now occupied by Mr. James Moore.// In the early stages of the war he was a flying officer with the British main fleet, under Admiral Jellicoe. When the fleet was in Lough Swilly, Lieut. Kinkead took occasion to visit Derry, and called upon his cousin, Mr. Alex. Thompson at Waterside.// Dead Airman's Funeral.// Flight-Lieutenant Kinkead will be buried with full honours in Fawcay Churchyard two miles from Calshot, to-day.// Further attempts to be made.// It is learned that the British Air Ministry intend to continue their attempts to break the world's air speed record now held by Italy. Airman's Career. Many Decorations For Gallantry.// **Flight-Lieutenant S. M. Kinkead**, D.S.O., D.S.C., D.F.C., who was a South African, was 31 years old. He was educated at the High School, Johannesburg, and at the Marist College. Joining the Royal Naval Air Service as a flight sub-lieutenant in September, 1915, he saw flying service during the War in the Near East for a year, and in the Dunkirk area in 1917-18. He also served with the British contingent operating in South Russia in 1919, and later saw service in Iraq and Egypt.// Flight-Lieutenant Kinkead was responsible for the ground organization on the northern sector in Africa on the occasion of the first Cairo-Cape flight carried out by the R.A.F. in 1925. After his return home he became an instructor at No. 5 Flying Training School at Sealand, near Chester, and last year he was chosen as one of the High-Speed Flight who prepared at Felixstowe for the Schneider Trophy Race at Venice in the summer. In that race he flew the Gloucester-Napier biplane, and, although engine trouble prevented him from finishing the course, he flew a particularly plucky race under difficulties. On their return to England the other members of the flight were posted to other units, Flight-Lieutenant Kinkead remaining alone as the nucleus of the flight for the next Schneider Trophy Race.// Kinkead was promoted Flight-Lieutenant, R.N.A.S., in June, 1917, became captain, R.A.F., on the formation of the joint organization, and was granted a permanent commission as a Flying Officer in the R.A.F. in August, 1919. He was promoted Flight-Lieutenant in January, 1922. He received the D.S.O. for attacking and dispersing a cavalry division in South Russia, the D.S.C. for conspicuous gallantry and skill in face of the enemy in aerial combats, and a bar to the D.S.C. when he attacked and brought down an Albatross machine. The D.F.C. was awarded to him for attacking enemy formations superior in numbers, and a bar was added to this decoration also

when he engaged and dispersed a large party of enemy troops in a wood.// The Master of Sempill, 'speaking on behalf of the Royal Aeronautical Society, of which he is president, said last night:--// Flight Lieutenant Kinkead earned our admiration as one of the few pilots, not only in this country, but in the world, who had experience of, and was capable of handling, these very difficult high-speed aircraft, and his loss is undoubtedly very great. We have got all too few people with that very special experience, which can only be made available to the limited few. We felt that Kinkead would unquestionably have captured for this country the world speed "record," and we regret his loss very much.// The Air Minister, speaking on the Estimates in Parliament last night, made sympathetic reference to Flight-Lieutenant Kinkead's death [The Times. Tuesday, March 13, 1928. Page 16, column 2].

These leases were found in the Minute Books of the Fishmongers Company. Volume 13 was microfilmed by the Church of Jesus Christ and Latter Day Saints (LDS) under microfilm #1966803.

The freehold leases differ from the other leases in that the value of the lands/premises were in excess of £20. The leasees had to pay 2 guinea to have their leases sealed.

The Fishmongers Company had leased their lands in Londonderry to the Earl of Tyrone for terms which included for the life of King George III. Thus, the lands reverted to the Fishmongers Company upon the death of King George III on 29 January 1820. A rent roll of the Manor of Walworth was received by them on 8 February 1820 (notation of such in vol. 11, p. 235). Representatives of the Company went to Londonderry and compiled a complete list of all tenants on the Company's lands. This was completed and its receipt was noted on 27 July 1820 (vol. 12, p. 50). It

was recorded as Appendix 5. Hence, somewhere in the Fishmongers records in London should be a complete rent roll of the estate done in 1820!!!!

Initially the Company had continued the previous leases for one year. Subsequent to that longer term leases were to be prepared. It is clear from comments that not all tenants initially wanted to enter into long term leases. These were hard times and they were taking a chance of holding year to year leases in the hope of getting better terms.

It was noted (vol. 12, p. 3 & 85) that prior to 1820 Protestant tenants held their holdings under sub-leases given by the Earl of Tyrone from 1749 to 1754. These were held under the same terms of the Earl so they expired in 1820. Hence, many of the existing tenants were direct descendants of the 1749-54 leasees. Prior to 1820, the Catholic tenants held for a term of years which expired about the year 1800 from which Catholics held at the pleasure of the Earl. They were subject to large increases in rent which many of the Protestants did not have to suffer as many still held at 1749-1754 rates.

More Fishmongers Company Leases in County Londonderry as abstracted by Peter A. Kincaid of Fredericton, NB, Canada.

Quite quickly after the Fishmongers got control of their Londonderry estate they attended to leasing out their larger and more valuable properties. There was a fair deal of discussion about this. The following is just a summary of how some of these were to be rented.

p. 150-151. 30 November 1820.

The Farm and House at Farloe had long been held by the Stirling family rent free. The desire was to rent it out to Rev. Robert Rentoul at £60 a year from November 1st. However, possible interests of Major Stirling in Dublin had to be addressed.

p. 151. 30 November 1820.

Mr. Barre Beresford was to have a lease of Walworth Demesne and House for 31 years at £330 a year. This was approved on p. 184 in the 14 December 1820 court session.

p. 152. 30 November 1820.

Mr. Beresford and Daniel McFarland were to give up their joint possession of the corn mill in Ballykelly as well as 8

acres of land called the Mill land.

p. 152-153. 30 November 1820.

Henry Boyle Hunter was to retain Drumcovit farm with a 21 year lease or 31 years without a life at £120 a year. He was to resign his interest on p. 430 (1 August 1823) to his brother, Mr. Richard Hunter, who with Mrs. D. W. Maxwell, jointly held Mr. Johnston's farm.

p. 153. 30 November 1820.

Rev. Marcus McCausland, about 70 years of age with no family, was to resign the townland of Broglasgow in November 1821. His nephew Mr. Hugh Boyle was to lease half of the townland. Hugh Boyle, Esq., was approved on p. 185 in the 14 December 1820 court session for part of Broglasgow except portions occupied by Rev. Robert Rentoul and Mrs. Holmes.

p. 189. 14 December 1820.

David Moore, Esq., gets lease of part of Upper Drummond, being about 34 acres, for 61 years from November last. He also had a option for 31 years of other land to be determined.

p. 431. 1 August 1823.

Mr. Robert Ogilby to hold Lisnakelly left him by the Will of his brother David Ogilby.
