I used the following conventions in this document: bolded name, bolded & underlined spouse, underlined important places. If a connection is not clear then "it is not certain" is added in red and underlined. Personal comments are also enclosed within {}. To save space the characters // were used to indicate a new paragraph. Male names with a red § following their names indicates that evidence suggests that their line failed due to an early death or due to there being no legitimate children. Sources follow the record in [].

Thanks also to others specifically noted within the text as having made information available. Cite them if you wish to use their contributed information. If it is my original contribution that is to be used in anyone's research, then I should be cited. A suggested citation is:

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Ninian Kinkead of county Londonderry
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The first reference to a Kincaid in county Londonderry was of **Ninian Kinkaide** who appears in the 1642 Muster Rolls of Londonderry City in Osborne's Company [Public Record Office of Northern Ireland. T/808/15176. 1642 Muster Roll of Londonderry City. As abstracted and forwarded to Peter A. Kincaid by Robert Forrest (14 Edenvale, Crossgar, Downpatrick, Northern Ireland, BT309PU; bobbyforrest63@hotmail.com) by Rootschat email dated 14 February 2009]. Ninian is a very rare Kincaid name and even quite rare as a forename in Northern Ireland. The Public Record Office of Northern Ireland (PRONI) has a searchable 'Name search' database and in it are only 13 entries of persons with this forename. It covered the 1740 Protestant Householders, 1766 Religious Census and Pre-1858 Wills and Admons. That included repeat entries for Ninian Boggs, Ninian Cayla, and Ninian Holmes.

Ninian is a name specific to the Kincaids of Auchenreoch, Campsie parish, Stirlingshire, Scotland. In particular it first appears in the family of John Kincaid of Auchenreoch. Auchenreoch is just east of the Kincaid of that ilk lands of Kincaid, Inchbreck, Inchbelly and Antermony.

The early Kincaids of Auchenreoch have been hard to untangle because Auchenreoch is at times spelt Auchinrevoch (as the following 18th century Roy Military Survey of Scotland shows) and there was at the same time a farm called

Auchinrevoch northeast of Kilsyth. In the 1590s there was allegedly a John Kincaid of Auchenreoch married to a Helen Carriber, a John Kincaid of Auchenreoch married to a Margaret Kincaid and a John Kincaid of Auchinrevoch who left a widow Isabel Forsyth.

It is clear from Scottish records (see <https://kyncades.org/ScotsKin.pdf>) that the Kincaids of Auchenreoch started with Henry Kincaid, second son of John Kincaid of Warriston and Margaret Bellenden. In 1567 he got a grant of the 18 acres of land of the priory of Saint Katherine of Sciennes below Edinburgh. This Henry Kincaid was married to Mariote/Marion Touris. It is said that in 1593, Henry Kincaid of Auchenreoch and his wife Marion Touris, and John Kincaid, their eldest son, and Helen Carriber, his wife, disposed these lands of Sciennes to the famous inventor of logarithms, John Napier of Merchiston. Marion Touris then appears in records as spouse of Henry Kincaid of Wester Carriber and we lose trace of him.

On 4 October 1592, one John Kincaid of Auchenreoch was married to a Margaret Kincaid. This created confusion with me because John Lennox Peareth of Lennox Castle's research notes refers to a document in the Particular Register of Inhibitions for Linlithgow dated 8 November 1595 relating to Henry Kincaid of Auchinreoch and his wife Marion Touris. He adds that their son and heir John Kincaid married Helen Carriber. However, this document could be referring to some prior document and the note about his son could be a personal note by John Lennox Peareth. After all, the Index to the Particular Register of Sasines for the sheriffdoms of Edinburgh, Haddington, Linlithgow and Bathgate gives notice to Henry Kincaid, his wife Marion Touris and his son John Kincaid for 21 March 1645 and these people were long dead by then. The other source to John Kincaid of Auchenreoch being

married to Helen Carriber is an article by W. Moir Bryce title 'The Convent of Catherine of Siena' published in the Book of the Old Edinburgh Club in 1918. They were even confused as to whether the person was Helen Carriber or Helen Cant. John Lennox Peareth and W. Moir Bryce are secondary sources like myself and thus prone to recording and interpretive errors. It seems likely that this is the case and the researchers confused John Kincaid of Auchinreoch with another John Kincaid married to Helen Carriber (of which we have notices of being in Over Gogar and/or Over Mungall). One really needs to dig into the registers of inhibitions for this period to sort this out and unfortunately they are not available to me right now. Until primary sources become available to show otherwise one has to assume that John Kincaid of Auchinreoch was never married to a Helen Carriber.

So going with what is known for certain (see <https://kyncades.org/ScotsKin.pdf>), that is that John Kincaid, son of Henry Kincaid of Auchinreoch, was married Margaret Kincaid by 4 October 1592. John then gets into a feud with his family to the point where a few months later, on 29 January 1592/3, John Kincaid of Auchinreoch had to find caution (some posting a bond as security) to not harm his brothers Thomas, Ninian (hereafter Ninian 1), Andrew and Robert. The brothers likewise did the same 5 days earlier. A few years later, on 4 May 1599, John is still at odds with his kin as David Kincaid in Auchinreoch likewise had to find caution not to harm John Kincaid of Auchinreoch. A record only 4 days later shows that John Kincaid of Auchinreoch was still married to Margaret Kincaid so it was clearly the same person. However, what now appears to be the case, is that Margaret Kincaid died soon thereafter and John Kincaid of Auchinreoch remarried to Isobel Forsyth of Dykes and they had sons Ninian (hereafter Ninian 2) and David in that order. John Kincaid of Auchinreoch was deceased by 23 January 1624 and Isobel Forsyth, his relict, died in Glasgow in April 1628.

So the Scottish records show that the first known Ninian Kincaid (Ninian 1), one of the brothers of John Kincaid of Auchinreoch, sometime between 1580 and 1590, was occupying part of the Vicars Yard in Glasgow with Robert Kincaid. This Robert was almost certainly his above noted brother. This Ninian 1 Kincaid would have been born before 1572 so it is highly unlikely that he was the Ninian Kincaid mustered in Londonderry in 1642 (hereafter Ninian 3). Ninian 1 Kincaid and his brother Thomas Kincaid are named in the Will of Malcolm Kincaid in Salchis dated 21 April 1599. On 9 August 1599 he witnessed a resignation by James Mayne in favour of his future spouse, Cristina Kincaid (daughter of Malcolm Kincaid of Salchis) of a liferent in a tenement near the place of the Friars Preachers in Glasgow. On 22 January 1600 he married Barbara Cuthill. On 1 March 1602 Ninian 1 and his brother Thomas are named in the Will of the said Cristina Kincaid. Ninian 1 Kincaid's wife, Barbara Cuthill, died in April 1606 and from her Testament Dative and Inventar dated 21 December 1607 we learn that 1) she left only a son named James by Ninian 1; 2) that said Ninian 1 was previously married to the late Agnes Fleming and they had a son Matthew and a daughter Sara; and 3) that Ninian 1 and his brother Thomas were maltmen and burgesses in Glasgow.

Now continuing to refer to my prior research notes on the Scottish Kincaids I suggested that Ninian 1 Kincaid, brother of John Kincaid of Auchinreoch likely married a third time to Isobel Ottirburne by 1610 when they start having children baptized. The reason being that Ninian 2 Kincaid, son of John Kincaid of Auchinreoch and Isobel Forsyth, would have been born after 1599 because John Kincaid of Auchinreoch was still married to Margaret Kincaid then. So Ninian 1 Kincaid, in addition to his children Matthew, Sara and James, had by Isobel Ottirburne the following children: Robert (bt 16 Sep 1610), Andrew 1 (bt 30 Jul 1611), Andrew 2 (bt 2 Sep 1613), Elizabeth (bt 19 Mar 1615), John (bt 12 Aug 1617), Jean (bt 2 Jun 1620), and James (bt 27 Oct 1622). Francis Kincaid, master of the Grammar School in Glasgow, was also noted as the lawful son of Niniane 1 Kincaid, maltman, on 7 December 1639 when he was appointed principal and regent of the College in Glasgow. For that position one would think he was over 25 so he would have been born before 1614 and perhaps the first born child of Ninian 1 and Isobel – likely since their marriage record remains unlocated. Or, if Andrew 1 Kincaid did not die an infant, then it is possible that Francis Kincaid, master of the Grammar School in Glasgow was Andrew 2 Kincaid renamed after a relative recently deceased – thus accounting for Andrew 2 Kincaid.

In all of this, we see that Ninian 1 Kincaid, brother of John Kincaid of Auchinreoch, maltman and burgher of Glasgow, did not have a son Ninian. As he was too old to be the Ninian 3 Kincaid mustered in Londonderry in 1642 then the latter was most likely the Ninian 2 Kincaid, son of John Kincaid of Auchinreoch and Isobel Forsyth. As Isobel named her son Ninian her executor in her Will dated 1 January 1628 he was at least 21 years old making him born between 1599 (when John Kincaid of Auchinreoch was still married to Margaret Kincaid versus Isobel) and 1607. Ninian 2 Kincaid was entered the College of Glasgow in 1622 so a circa 1606 year of birth is fitting. He also

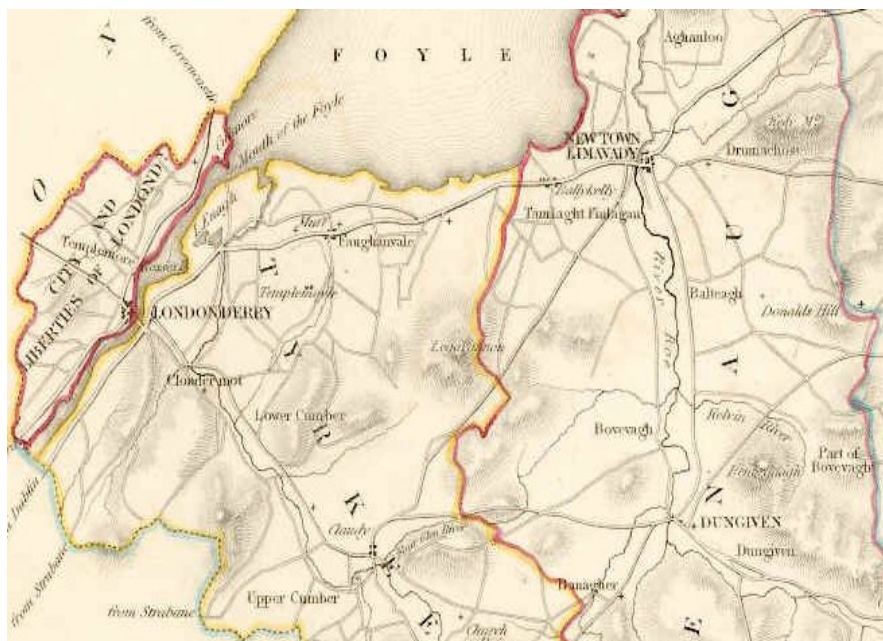
lines up perfectly with the Ninian Kincaid who married Jonet Luggie in Glasgow on 11 November 1630. They had a son Ninian Kincaid (hereafter Ninian 4) baptized on 15 Apr 1633. On 4 November 1635 Ninian 2 Kincaid was a witness with James Kincaid to a disposition of 2 riggs of land by Robert Boyd to Arthur Luggie, burges of Glasgow, and Marion Mure his wife. We have located no further record of Ninian 2 Kincaid in Scotland making him almost certainly the Ninian 3 Kincaid mustered in Londonderry seven years later.

The known records in Scotland pertaining to Ninian 2 Kincaid, son of John Kincaid of Auchenreoch and Isobel Forsyth of Dykes, as well as his brother David Kincaid, are as follows:

- xxij J[anua]ri 1624. Prenteis Kincaid. The said day **David Kincaid sone to vmq[ui]lle Johne Kincaid of Auchinrivocheis** buikit heirin printeis to Jo[h]n Clark zounger tailzeo[u]r burges of Glasgow to serve him fywe zer printeis and twa zer for meitt and fie be his indento[u]r of [th]e dait ye xxij of Ja[nua]ri 1624 [The records of the Trades House of Glasgow. A.D. 1605-1678. Glasgow: Printed for The Trades House of Glasgow, 1910. p. 108].
- **Isobel Forsyth, relict of the late John Kincaid of Auchinrevoche**, had her testament testamentar registered in the Glasgow Commissary Court on 6 September 1628. She died in Glasgow in April 1628. She had an estate valued at £175.13.4. She owed £214.13.4. In her testament dated 1 January 1628, she names **her eldest lawful son, Niniane Kincaid**, her only executor. Her testament was witnessed by **her lawful son David Kincaid**. Johnne Kincaid in Auchinrevoche owed her estate £23.6.8. Her brother, Willarde Forsyth of Dykes, owed her £33.6.8.

- Niniane Kincaid married Jonnet Luggie in Glasgow, Lanark on 11 November 1630.
- Ninian, lawful son of Ninian Kinked and Jonet Luggie, was baptized in Glasgow High Church, Lanark on 15 April 1633. The witnesses were **James Kinked** and Peter Cummyng.
- Disposition by the said Robt Boyd of the saids 2 riggs to Arthur Luggie burges of Glasgow and Marion Mure his spouse dated 4 Nov 1635. It bears the signatures of Robert Boyd and of three witnesses: **James and Ninian Kincaid** and William Zair. [University of Glasgow Archive Services, Glasgow, UK. As far as other records pertaining to a Ninian 2 Kincaid (assuming Ninian 2 = Ninian 3) of that period in Ireland, they are as follows:

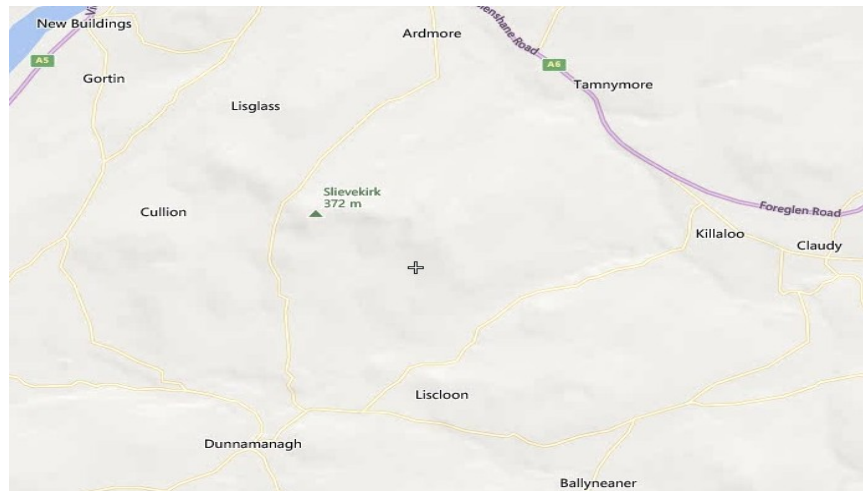
- On 2 March 1653/4 **Ninion Kinkead**, with Robert Carr, yeoman, Mary Stevenson and Robert Crothers, all of Dromchose parish, were granted Recognizances [Public Record Office of Northern Ireland. T/808/15130. Summonister Rolls, county Londonderry, 1615-1670. No. 46 – Londonderry Assizes 1 May 1655. As abstracted and forwarded to Peter A. Kincaid by Robert Forrest (14 Edenvale, Crossgar, Downpatrick, Northern Ireland, BT309PU; bobbyforrest63@hotmail.com) by Rootschat email dated 14 February 2009].
- On 1 April 1658, **Ninian Kinkead of Ardmore**, was recorded at the Londonderry Assizes [Public Record Office of Northern Ireland. Summonister Rolls, county Londonderry, 1615-1670. No. 50 – Londonderry Assizes 1 April 1658. As abstracted and forwarded to Peter A. Kincaid by Robert Forrest (14 Edenvale, Crossgar, Downpatrick, Northern Ireland, BT309PU; bobbyforrest63@hotmail.com) by Rootschat email dated 14 February 2009].

Now the first record dated 2 March 1653/3 has Ninian 3 Kinkead (for Irish discussion Ninian 3 will be used even though likely the same person as Ninian 2) in Drumachose parish (therein spelt Dromchose), county Londonderry which is the area about Limavady. A recognizance is a conditional pledge of money before a court whereby the party is obliged to undertake a particular act – in many cases to keep the peace or to appear before the court at a later date. Bail is a type of recognizance. So clearly Ninian 3 Kinkead had gotten himself in a bit of trouble at that time. Limavady is in Drumachose parish so presumably this is where he was living at the time.

The second record, dated 1 April 1658, has Ninian 3 Kinkead of Ardmore and as part of an Assize in Londonderry. Which Ardmore is the question. There is an Ardmore in Glendermott parish southeast of Londonderry, an Ardmore in Balteagh parish, and an Ardmore in Donagheady parish, county Tyrone.

With regards to Ardmore townland in Glendermott parish, county Londonderry, this townland fronts on the Faughan river and lies between Ballyshasky townland on the west and Glenkeen townland on the east. Lisdillon townland on its southeast stretches all the way back to the summit of Sliev Kirk mountain marking the border with Donagheady parish, county Tyrone. Since the 1 April 1658 record relates to an Assize in Londonderry the Ardmore in

Glendermot parish one might first think it to be the most likely townland. Not only is it the closest to Londonderry but the road leading to it from Londonderry is called the Ardmore road. So it would be the most familiar to Londonderry residents. However, the Assize dealt with legal matters for the whole county so the other Ardmore have to be considered.

As one of the records above relate to Drumachose parish, one has to suspect more, Balteagh parish southeast of Limavady. Balteagh parish lies just below Drumachose parish. This is further supported by there being Kincaids in the immediate Limavady area, including Balteagh parish, on into the mid 1700s. Ardmore townland in Balteagh parish is on the Drumsurn Road. On its north is Glebe townland (Balteagh parish) and the parish line with Ballynahenry townland (Drumachose parish). On its east is Drumgesh townland. On its south is Ballymully and Little Derry townlands. On its west is Edenmore townland. This townland contained the Old parish Church and school house. There was a Presbyterian Meeting House two townlands south in Lislane townland. On the south side of Little Derry is Aghansillagh townland, Balteagh parish. John Kinkead and his wife Jane Noble were of Aghansillagh when in 1732 he conveyed his leasehold interest in Ballynahenry townland to Robert Scott of Little Derry. The fact that the first record of Ninian deals with Drumachose parish just above Ardmore and that Kincaids were still in the immediate vicinity of Ardmore in the early 1700s makes this Ardmore the most likely place where he dwelt.

The only other record of a Ninian Kincaid in Ireland is that of Ninian Kincaid of Ballyneaner, Donaghedy parish, county Tyrone (hereafter Ninian 5 Kinkead) who is recorded in the vestry books for the Church of Ireland, Donaghedy parish on 10 April 1705 [Bready Ancestry. Donaghedy Church of Ireland, Vestry Book 1698-1723 . <http://www.breadyancestry.com>]. Ballyneaner townland is on the opposite side of English mountain from Ballycallaghan and Gortnaskey (i.e. immediately southeast of them). The 1666 Hearth Money Rolls records Gilbert

Jonston, James Moffat, and William Orr in Ballyneaner (recorded as Bellimnor) [PRONI. T/307A] so Ninian 5 Kinkead would have moved there after 1666. Ardmore, Donagheady parish fits for Ninian 3 Kinkead of Ardmore as it is the closest to Ballyneaner. Assuming that Ninian 3 Kinkead = Ninian 2 Kincaid of Scotland then the timeline lines up well for Ninian 5 Kinkead of Ballyneaner being = Ninian 4 Kincaid of Scotland (the son of Ninian 2 Kincaid and Jonet Luggie). Yes this get mind boggling, but the numbering system should help.

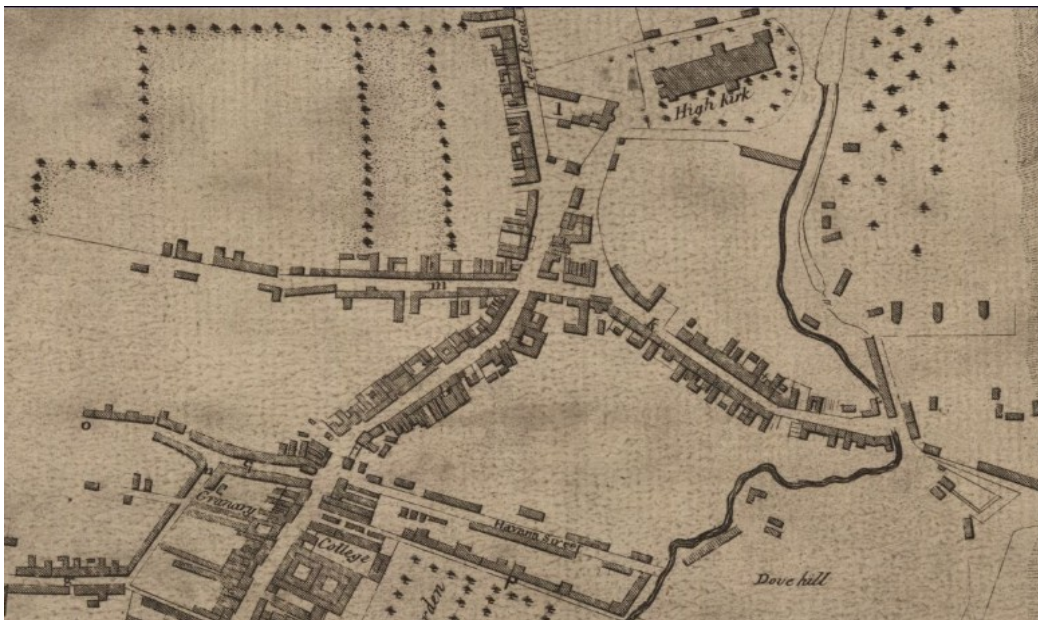

Ardmore townland in Donaghedy parish is on the border with Craigtown, Glendermot parish, county Londonderry and between lies in Donaghedy parish on the west side of Cullion townland, east side of Gortmonly hill/townland, and northside of Dullerton townland. One thing that keeps this as a possible candidate is that the principal holders of the Donaghedy lands of Ardmore were the McMorris family. As noted above, Ninian is also a rare name in Northern Ireland. However, the McMorris family of Ardmore included a son Ninian McMorris at the end of the 1700s who became a surgeon in the Royal Navy and an author of note. Perhaps the name is indicative of descent from Ninian 3 Kinkead a former holder of the lands the McMorris ended up with.

Another thing that may support Ninian's holding Ardmore, Donaghedy parish is that there was a Francis Kinkead in Donaghedy parish, county Tyrone in the 1660s. **Francis Kinkeid** was listed as a servant of Archibald Galbraith, gent. & wife in the townland of Ardugboy in the 1660 Poll book of Donaghedy parish. He was assessed at 1s so he was unmarried. He would have been born before 1646. This is the only known reference to a Francis Kinkead in the area. Ardugboy is an extinct place name and does not appear in later lists of townlands for Donaghedy parish. The 1666 Hearth Money Rolls for Donaghedy parish has one widow Galbraith in the townland of Ardnegloy. The widow Galbraith is certainly the wife of Archibald Galbraith, gent., of Ardugboy. Thus, Ardnegloy can be identified on the 1756 map of Donaghedy parish in the Abercorn Papers as Ardnaghloy. It is akin to what is now called the townland of Stranabrosny which is just one townland southeast of Ardmore, Donaghedy parish.

Dr. William J. Roulston equates Ardugboy with Mountcastle [Roulston, William J. Three centuries of life in a Tyrone parish: A history of Donaghedy from 1600 to 1900. Letterkenny: Strabane Historical Society, 2010. p. 11]. Mountcastle presently lies on the northside of Stranabrosny and seems to be a subdivision of the latter. Stranabrosny sits with Moyagh (to its west) on the northern side of the Burndennet River which is the border between it and the townland of Killyclooney. One follows the Burndennet from its mouth at the River Foyle just below Grange, eastward to Tullyard when it turns southward to reach Dunnamanagh and beyond.

Since Francis Kinkeid was a servant of Archibald Galbraith, it is possible that was the **Francis Kincaid** who married **Issobell Galbraith** in Glasgow, Lanark on 27 June 1650. If so, she would have passed away as the Ardugboy Francis was a single person in 1660. There was a Francis Kincaid, son of Ninian Kincaid, maltman and burghess of Glasgow, who was the Master of the Grammar School in Glasgow from 1639 so one could suggest that this educator could be the Francis Kincaid who married Issobell Galbraith in 1650. This would lead one to think the Galbraith connection in Donaghedy parish coincidental. However, record show that Francis Kincaid, Master of the Grammar School in Glasgow was married to Margaret Bailie at that time. His eldest son and heir John Kincaid of Corsbasket,

was also an heir of John Bailie of Park via his mother. Francis Kincaid of the Grammar School's third son by Margaret Baillie was baptized at Glasgow High Church on 27 January 1652 leaving no room for a marriage to Issobell Galbraith in 1650. So the Francis Kincaid who married Issobel Galbraith on 27 June 1650 was another Francis. The Francis Kincaid of Ardugboy/Mountcastle, Donagheady parish is the best fitting Francis Kincaid known for that time. There was a Francis Kincaid, son of John Kincaid in Straiton/Straughtoun, who was apprenticed with James Murdoch, cordiner, in Edinburgh on 13 October 1658. As an apprentice he would only be a teenager then so not likely a young married 8 years earlier. Besides him the only other known Francis Kincaids were born after 1650. Francis Kincaid, son of James Kincaid, merchant, burges of Glasgow, and Margaret Findlay, was baptized on 9 March 1658; Francis Kincaid, son of Francis Kincaid, Master of the Grammar School, and Margaret Bailie, was baptized in Glasgow on 4 July 1658; and Francis Kincaid, son of James Kincaid, maltman of Glasgow, and Agnes Maxwell, was baptized in Glasgow on 26 May 1676.

Now as further evidence for linking the two, Archibald Galbraith of Mountcastle (Ardugboy) actually held land in Glasgow on the north side of those held by Francis Kincaid, Master of the Grammar School in Glasgow and William Kincaid of Auchinreoch. Francis Kincaid of the Grammar School would be a first cousin of Ninian 2 Kincaid, son of John Kincaid and Isobel Forsyth (our suggested Ninian 3 Kincaid in Ireland), while William Kincaid of Auchinreoch would have been Ninian 2 Kincaid's nephew.

Archibald Galbraith was the only son of John Galbraith, merchant in Glasgow, and, on 29 June 1633, acquired a tenement in Glasgow that once belonged to the chaplainry of St John Baptist and to the College of Glasgow. The tenement was located near the cross called the Wyndhead of Glasgow. Keep in mind that the whole population of Glasgow in 1660 was only about 14700 [Chambers, Robert. *The Gazetteer of Scotland*. Glasgow: Blackie and Son, 1838. <https://victorianweb.org/history/scotland/glasgow/population.html>] so these tenements would have been more sizeable than today's standards. They included backland for gardens, etc. (see Canmore, SC 1322404. <https://canmore.org.uk/collection/1322404>). The Wyndhead is upper High Street where it intersects Rottenrow and Drygate. The Mercat Cross (or Glasgow Cross) is where Tolbooth Steeple is located – namely at the intersection of Saltmarket, Trongate, Hight Street, Gallowgate and London road. High Street which started above Gallowgate was initially called the High Street from the Mercat Cross to High Kirk (or the High Street from the High Kirk to the Mercat Cross). It just got simplified to High Street. This Archibald of High Street, Glasgow became Archibald Galbraith of Moutcastle, county Tyrone and his son and heir became John Galbraith of Blessingbourne, county Tyrone. The latter had sons Robert Galbraith and Arthur Galbraith who moved to Dublin and county Meath. In 1715 said Robert Galbraith's son and heir was James Galbraith of Riverstown, county Meath.

- 29 June 1633. Disposition by Thomas Hay in favour of **Archibald Galbraith, only lawful son to the deceased John Galbraith**, merchant in Glasgow, of the tenement of land which once belonged to the chaplainry of St John Baptist and to the College of Glasgow near the cross called the wyndhead of Glasgow [NAS. - Galbraith of Balgair (5th S. xi. 87, 198)--Perhaps Y.S.M. can inform me whether Robert Galbraith of Cloncorick was the eldest son of **John Galbraith of Blessingbourne**. Robert Galbraith mentions that his mother has a claim to the lands of Killwaden, co. Tyrone. He had three sons, James, Hugh, and Humphrey, and two daughters, Lettice and Margaret. He alludes to his "kinswoman Elizabeth Foster, alias Gledstanes," "brother Arthur Galbraith," and "brother-in-law Charles King." **John Galbraith of Blessingbourne** had by his wife Margaret two sons, Robert and Arthur, and daughters, Jennet, Anne, Katerine (Charles King's wife was named Katherine), Elizabeth and Isobel. He mentions his sister Agnes having married, in 1667, James Gledstanes of Fardross, co. Tyrone, "uncle Robert" (? father of Col. R. Galbraith of Dowlish), and his cousin Capt. Jas. Galbraith of Ramoran. His father he describes as "**Archibald Galbraith, late of Montfastle**" (?), who had lands and tenements in Glasgow, **inherited from his father John Galbraith.**// C.S.K.// Kensington, W. [Notes and Queries: A medium of intercommunication for literary men, general readers, etc. London: John Francis, 1879. Fifth series - Volume twelfth (July-December, 1879), p. 15].

Riverstown, county Meath is in Duleek parish, upper Duleek barony. This is interesting because one townland east of Riverstown is Balgeeth townland, Ardcaith parish – being only separated by the townland of Scatternagh or Hawkinstown. John Kinkead, nephew of Samuel Kinkead of Coleraine was of this Balgeeth when Samuel did his Will on 16 July 1762. Now Elizabeth Garnett, daughter of John Garnett of Balgeeth and Anne Hatch, married Henry Kincaid in Dublin in 1739 so presumably the nephew John was the son of this Henry Kinkead.

Could they be connected? Well, as noted above, Ninian 2 Kincaid, son of John Kincaid of Auchenchroch and Isobel Forsyth of Dykes, was apparently born between 1600 and 1607. Being the Ninian 2 Kincaid who married Jonet Luggie in Glasgow on 11 November 1630 he had a son Ninian 4 Kincaid born around 15 April 1633 when the later was baptized. Ninian 4 Kincaid presumably became the Ninian 5 Kinkead of Ballyneaner, Donagheady parish, county Tyrone. There is a three year gap between Ninian 2 Kincaid and Jonet Luggie's marriage and the baptism of Ninian 4 Kinkead so Francis Kinkeid could have been the first child of Jonet Luggie if born in 1631. On this line of thought this Francis would go on to marry Issobell Galbraith when 19 years old (1650) and move to her father's Mountcastle estate where she passes away before the 1660 poll book was made. All very plausible. Further children of Ninian 2 Kincaid and Jonet Luggie would be born in the 1630s and 1640s and start appearing in the late 1650s and 1660s. Likewise and children of Ninian 4 Kincaid and possible brother Francis Kincaid (m. Isobell Galbraith) would be born in the 1650s and 1660s and start appearing in records in the 1670s and 1680s. This is to be kept in mind as we look at other Kincaids in the Londonderry vicinity.

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James Kinkead of Newtown-Limavady
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First of tackle is James Kinkead of Newtown Limavady, Tamlaght Finlagan parish, county Londonderry. John Higginbottom executed his last Will and Testament at Jeme Kinkade's house at Newtown-Limavady on 28 March 1655. Jeme was also a witness and gave his mark. Although illiterate he clearly was in good company as another witness was William Jackson of Killowen - of the Jacksons of Coleraine fame. Captain William Jackson (1628-1688) married firstly Elizabeth Staples, daughter of Sir Alexander Staples & Elizabeth Conyngham of Coleraine, and secondly Susan Beresford, daughter of Sir Tristram Beresford [Brown, Sharon Oddie. 'Timeline of Jackson's of Coleraine.' The Silver Bowl. <https://www.thesilverbowl.com/documents/TABLES/JACKSONS-Timeline-Coleraine.html>]. The Jacksons dominated affairs in Coleraine from the close of the century and the Beresfords dominated Limavady.

Since James Kinkade had a house he was of legal age and thus born before 1634. This would make him too old to be the son of Ninian 3 Kinkead. However, Ninian 3 Kinkead's presumed mother, Isobel Forsyth, was not the first wife of John Kincaid of Auchenreoch. John Kincaid also had John (his heir), James, Jeane, and Christian (m. John Cadder) by prior spouses. The witnesses to the baptism of Ninian 4 Kinkead on 15 April 1633 was James Kinked and Peter Cummyng (see above). James was undoubtedly the father's brother. Peter Cumyng was married to Jonet Kincaid and witnessed the baptism of most of James Kinked, merchant, burges of Glasgow, and Margaret Dalrumpell children (see below). Jean and Jane are fully interchangeable in Scotland and in earlier times was used as a synonym for Janet/Jonet (<https://www.whatsinaname.net/female-names/Jean.html>). Thus, Peter Cumyng was likely married to the sister of James Kincaid, merchant, burges of Glasgow. The only children's baptism Peter Cumyng did not witness was John (the eldest surviving son), Agnes and Jonet. William Zair, a witness with Peter Cumyng to the baptism of James's daughter Isobel Kincaid in 1639 (see below), was also a witness with Ninian and James Kincaid to the above noted disposition by Robert Boyd to Arthur Luggie and Marion Mure on 4 November 1635. All in all, it fits well that Ninian 3 Kinkead of Londonderry was the son of John Kincaid of Auchenreoch and Isobel Forsyth and was joined in Limavady by half-brother James Kinked, merchant, burges of Glasgow sometime after he lost his wife Margaret Dalrumpell in October 1640.

- On 21 April 1609, **John Kincaid of Auchenreoch** disposed an annual rent of 120 pounds uplifted from the lands of Over Auchinreoch to **James Kincaid, his son, and Jeane and Christian Kincaid, his daughters**[Kincaid of Auchenreoch papers, no. 35 & 36].
- James Kinkaid in Sauches was named as a curator -with Robert Kinkaid of Hunterston and Robert Kinkaid, maltman in Glasgow -to **John Kinkaid, son of John Kinkaid of Auchinreoch**, on 23 July 1614, in a settlement with **Christiane Kinkaid, and John Cadder, her husband**, over the 21 April 1609, disposition by **John Kinkaid of Auchenreoch** of an annual rent of 120 pounds uplifted from the lands of Over Auchinreoch to **James Kinkaid, his son, and Jeane and Christian Kinkaid, his daughters** [Kincaid of Auchenreoch papers, no. 35].
- **Ninian, lawful son of Ninian Kinked and Jonet Luggie**, was baptized in Glasgow High Church, Lanark on 15 April 1633. The witnesses were **James Kinked** and Peter Cummyng.
- James Kinked, lawful son of James Kinked and Margaret Darumpill, was baptized in Glasgow High Church, Lanark on 10 February 1628. The witnesses were **Peter Cummyng** and Patrick Colquhoun.
- John Kinked, lawful son of James Kinked and Margaret Dalrumpell, was baptized in Glasgow High Church, Lanark on 19 May 1629. The witnesses were Patrick Colquhoun and George Cuik.
- Agnes, lawful daughter of James Kinked and Margaret Dalrumpell, was baptized in Glasgow High Church, Lanark on 14 July 1631. The witnesses were Robert Hamiltoune and Patrick Colquhoune.
- Jonet, lawful daughter of James Kinked and Margaret Dalrumpell, was baptized in Glasgow High Church, Lanark on 29 August 1633. The witnesses were James Findlay and Patrick Colquhoun.
- James, lawful son of James Kinked and Margaret Dalrumpel, was baptized in Glasgow High Church, Lanark on 7 August 1635. The witnesses were James Findlay and **Peter Cummyng**.
- Andrew, lawful son of James Kinked and Margaret Dalrumpell, was baptized in Glasgow High Church, Lanark on 19 August 1636. The witnesses were Robert Hamiltoun and **Peter Cummyng**.
- Grissell, lawful daughter of James Kinked and Margaret Dalrumpell, was baptized in Glasgow High Church, Lanark on 10 January 1638. The witnesses were Robert Hamiltoun and **Peter Cummyng**.
- Isobel, lawful daughter of James Kinked and Margaret Dalrumpell, was baptized in Glasgow High Church, Lanark on 5 June 1639. The witnesses were **Peter Cummyng** and **William Zair**.
- James, lawful son of James Kinked and Margaret Dalrumpell, was baptized in Glasgow High Church,

Lanark on 15 October 1640. The witnesses were Robert Hamiltoun and **Peter Cummyng**.

James Kinkead of Limavady appears again on 23 July 1655 as a witness with Neal O’Cahan to the marriage of Shane O’Cahan and Katherine Clark at St. Columb’s Cathedral. The O’Cahans were masters of county Londonderry before the Plantation and dominated Limavady and surrounding area. It is rather remarkable that James Kinkead was so closely tied to the O’Cahans since there was much bad blood between O’Cahans and Plantationers due to their great slaughter of the settlers during the 1641 rebellion. Shane O’Cahan seems to have been a Catholic and had his lands centered on the townlands of Campsie on the Faughan river in Faughanvale parish.

- The *Marriage registers of Derry Cathedral (St Columb's)*, parish of Templemore has **James Kinkead** and Neal O'Chane as witnesses to the marriage of Shand O'Chane and Katherine Clarke at Londonderry on 23 July 1655.
- The 1654 Civil Survey records in the 'Forefieted Land in parish of ffaughanvale': Shane O'Chane Esq'r of Campson Eitragh, Irish Papist; His estate had 10 townlands - 9 in parish of Faughanvale; all forfeited: His mansion house was upon his townland of Campson-Eitragh [As abstracted and forwarded to Peter A. Kincaid by Robert Forrest (14 Edenvale, Crossgar, Downpatrick, Northern Ireland, BT309PU; bobbyforrest63@hotmail.com) by Rootschat email dated 27 February 2009].

The next reference to a James Kinkead of Newtown-Limavady was in the 1663 Hearth Money Rolls. He is likely the same James Kinkead in Limavady as above. However, if the James Kinked who married Margaret Dalrumpell then he may have passed on and this is his son. James, lawful son of James Kinked and Margaret Dalrumpell, was baptized in Glasgow High Church, Lanark on 15 October 1640. If James Jr., then he would have been 23 years old which is a fitting age for the Hearth Money Rolls. James Kinked and Margaret Dalrumpell’s first known child was born in 1628 so James would have been born before 1610 (if 18 when first a dad) and more likely before 1607 if of legal age when he married. This would make him in his early 50s in 1663 so a more likely fit since we don’t know yet which, if any, of his children survived to adulthood. There is no further indication of him in Limavady so he either passed away not long after or moved.

- The *1663 Hearth Money Rolls for County Derry* records **James Kinkead** in Newtowne Townland, Drumacose (i.e. Drumachose) parish.

It should be noted that this last James Kinkead of Newtown-Limavady was contemporary with the above noted Francis Kinkead of Donagheady parish. So this once again is evidence for Ninian Kinkead’s Ardmore being the one southeast of Limavady versus the one in Donagheady parish.

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Alexander Kinkaid of Dunboe parish, county Londonderry
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The next Kincaid appearing in county Londonderry was Alexander Kinkaid of Dunboe parish, county Londonderry. Dunboe parish lies on the coast and is on the west side of Killowen parish on the west side of Coleraine. On its south is Formoyle and Macosquin parishes. On its southwest is Aghanloo parish. On the southside of Aghanloo parish, and southwest side of Formoyle parish, is Drumachose parish. Dunboe parish is only about 7 miles northeast of Newtown-Limavady.

A 25 August 1656 record of him has Alexander being of Drumbo parish, county Londonderry. There is no Drumbo parish in county Londonderry. The only parishes sounding close to it are Dunboe parish and Drumachose parish. The well known Londonderry genealogist, Robert Forrest, believes Drumbo to be Dunboe near Coleraine. This is supported by the 13 August 1655 record below in which Alexander Kinkaid is a witness at Newtown-Limavady to a lease relating to lands in Dunboe parish. The next day he gave a disposition as at witness at the same place. Clearly he must have been a resident in the area as were most of the other witnesses.

- Clothworkers' Estate lease dated 13 August 1655 from John McClelland, Lord Kirkcudbright, to Thos Cunningham & Wm Fleming of Dunboe yeomen. Lease was of townland of Tiperclair in parish of Dunboe for 11 years. The witnesses to this lease were **Alex'r Kinkaid**, Jo McClellan & Wil Thomsone [Public

The 25 & 26 August 1656 references related to a dispute in the 1650s between Sir Robert Maxwell of Killyleagh (grandson of Robert McClelland, Lord Kirkcudbright) who married Ann, Countess of Clanbrassil, widow of James Hamilton 2nd Viscount Clandeboye, and Lt Col Tristram Beresford over certain lands in Aghanloo parish which were part of the Haberdashers' estate; namely at Ballycastle, Carbullion, Lisronan, Crott, & ors (known as the six towns of Artikelly). Robert Maxwell of Spottis or Orchardtoun, Kirkcudbright, Scotland and Ballycastle, county Londonderry had married the daughter and heir of Robert Maclennan of Bombie, 1st Lord Kirkcudbright. Robert Maclennan, 1st Lord Kirkcudbright had married secondly Mary Montgomery, daughter of Hugh Montgomery, 1st Viscount Montgomery of the Great Ards, but had no issue by her ["Maclellan, Lord Kirkcudbright." These Maxwell, Lord Kirkcudbright and Lord Montgomery connections strongly suggest that the Alexander Kinkead here was the Capt. Alexander Kinkead of Lord Montgomery's Regiment. Lord Montgomery of Ardes' Regiment of Foot was commissioned to be raised in 1641. It's garrison was at Newtownards below Bangor, county Down and was quartered mostly at or around nearby Comber. It's commander was two successive Hugh Montgomery, Viscount Montgomery of Ards. The first Hugh, father of the second, died in November 1642 after raising the regiment. He was the son of Hugh Montgomery, Viscount Montgomery of Great Ards and Sara Maxwell, daughter of Sir John Maxwell, Lord Herries of Terregles. He married Jean, eldest daughter of William Alexander, 1st Earl of Stirling, and Janet Erskine. Captain Alexander Kinkead was in Dublin at the time of his death in 1661. While his Will did not survive a genealogical abstract was done of it by Sir William Betham. He had a brother Clement Kinkead and children Robert, John, Paul, Hugh, Margaret and Mary.

Clement Kincaid is another one of those rare Kincaid names specific to the Kincaids of Coates and Broughton. The most notable one being the eventual heir of of the former; namely Clement Kincaid of Coates. However, he was born before 1549 and died between 1 September 1608 & 17 April 1616. His children were John (d. bef 6 Jul 1616), Alexander (d. June 1616), Robert, James (d. bef 6 Jul 1616), Barbara (d. 1636, m. Daniel Coultis), and Margaret (m. Arthur Stratoun). There were three known Clement Kincaids who could have been the brother of Captain Alexander Kincaid. The first was Clement Kincaid grandson of the above Clement Kincaid of Coates via son Robert Kincaid. Next was Clement Kincaid, son of John Kincaid of Broughton and Helen Johnstoun, and husband of Esther Wood. The last was Clement Kincaid son of Robert Kincaid and Margaret Barnes who was baptized on 12 February 1637 in Canongate. This is the only record of this last Clement.

Clement Kincaid, son of Robert Kincaid, son of Clement Kincaid of Coates, was born aft 22 August 1611 as he still had a tutor on 22 August 1625. He died in 1681 and his testament dative and inventar was registered in the Edinburgh Commissary Court on 1 December 1682. He left no legitimate heirs as children of his aunt Barbara who married Daniel Couttis were declared his nearest heirs. The line of Clement Kincaid of Coates had, as they say, daughtered out.

This only leaves Clement Kincaid son of John Kincaid, portioner of Broughtoun, and Helen Johnstoun. Broughtoun is now a northern district of Edinburgh. John and Helen did have a son Alexander who fits as Captain Alexander Kincaid. The testament dative and inventar of Helen Johnstoun, relict of John Kincaid, portioner of Broughton, was registered in the Edinburgh Commissary Court on 20 February 1624. In it she names her children Robert, Alexander, Clement and Anna Kincaid and names them her executors dative. Thus, they were all of legal age and born before 1603. John Kincaids heir was actually Thomas Kincaid. Eldest sons are not always named in testament datives. Clement married Esther Wood on 3 May 1610 and together they had James (1611), John (1615), Helen (1616), George (1619), Marion (1623), and Edward (1625). Clement seems to also have had an illegitimate son named John by Margaret Young before he married. John was baptized on 28 January 1608 in Edinburgh parish. As one can see this Clement was not the son of Robert Kincaid of Coates as the later was still and minor under tutelage in 1625. However, the latter could be the Clement Kincaid who had a son David by Alisone Gibson baptized in Lasswade parish, Midlothian on 2 September 1628. Clement Kincaid, grandson of Clement Kincaid of Coates could have come of age by this time and this was his son. On the other hand, Esther Wood could have passed away and this was another son of Clement Kincaid, son of John Kincaid of Broughton. Assuming that this Clement, son of John Kincaid of Broughton, was at least 16 when he married Esther Wood then he was born before 1594 and probably about 1589. No evidence of this Clement Kincaid could be found in Scotland after 1628.

- **Heleine Johnestoun, relict of John Kincaid, portioner of Bruchtowne**, parish of St. Cuthbert, had her testament dative and inventar registered in the Edinburgh Commissary Court on 20 February 1624. She died in October -apparently of the previous year. It was given up by **Robert, Alexander, Clement, and Anna Kincaid**, her lawful children, and as her executors dative. She left an estate valued at £1989.0.4. out of which debts amounting to £160.6.8. were owed.
- **Johnne, son of Clement Kincaide fornicator with Margaret Young**, was baptized in Edinburgh parish, Edinburgh, Midlothian on 28 January 1608. The witnesses were Johnne Blak and Johnne Sprot, officire.
- **Clement Kincaid** and **Esther Wood** were married in Edinburgh parish, Midlothian on 3 May 1610 ["The Register of Marriages for the parish of Edinburgh, 1595-1700." Ed. Henry Paton. Edinburgh: Printed for the Society by J. Skinner & Company, 1905. Scottish Record Society. 27: 382-383].
- **James, son of Clement Kincaid, officer, and Easther Wood**, was baptized in Edinburgh parish, Midlothian on 7 March 1611. The witnesses were James Henrysone and James Richardsone
- **Johnne, son of Clement Kincaid and Easther Wod**, was baptized in Edinburgh parish, Midlothian on 7 May 1615. The witnesses were Johnne Dickiesone and Robert Gibsone.
- **Helene, daughter of Clement Kincaid and Easther Wood**, was baptized in Edinburgh parish, Midlothian on 15 November 1616. The witnesses were Edward Kincaid and James Woode.
- **George, son of Clement Kincaid and Esther Wood**, was baptized in Edinburgh parish, Midlothian on 11 July 1619. The witnesses were Mr. George Kincaid, George Kincaid and George Duncan, merchants.
- **Marione, daughter of Clement Kincaid and Easther Wood**, was baptized in Edinburgh parish, Midlothian on 18 February 1623. The witnesses were Johnne Heart and James Robesone.
- **Edward, son of Clement Kincaid and Easter Wood**, was baptized in Edinburgh parish, Midlothian on 18 September 1625. The witnesses were Edward Kincaid and Adame Skowlor.
- **David, son of Clement Kincaid and Alisone Gipsone**, was baptized in Lasswade parish, Midlothian on 2 September 1628.

All in all, it looks like Alexander and Clement Kincaid, sons of the John Kincaid of Broughton and Helen Johnstoun settled in Ireland with the former being Captain Alexander Kinkead, the 1649 officer. Sons of Captain Alexander Kinkead to look for are Robert, John, Paul and Hugh. Sons of Clement Kincaid to look for are James, John, George, Edward and possibly David – albeit we don't yet know which, if any, of the latter survived to adulthood.

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Robert Kinkade of Campsey, Faughanvale parish

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The 1663 Hearth Money Rolls for county Londonderry also records one Robert Kinkade of Campsey, Faughanvale parish, county Londonderry. According to Alfred Moore Munn's Notes on the Place Names of the parishes and Townlands of the county of Londonderry (pub. 1925) alternate names/spellings for Campsey Upper and Lower were Camson eitragh, Camsontragh, Campsonwotragh, Camsey, Camson and probably Carnfontragh. This is thus clearly Lower Campsey at the mouth of the Faughan river at upper northwest border of the parish or Upper Campsey to its immediate southeast. Clearly there was a subdivision of Campsey at one point to make Lower and Upper portions. We don't know enough to say whether he was a son of Ninian 3 Kinkead of Ardmore or of James Kinkead of Newtown Limavady. However, as noted above, the latter was a witness of the marriage of Shane O'Cahan who held lands in Campsey townland so one first thinks of a connection to him. However, on the assumption that Ninian 3 and James were brothers it seems more likely he was the son of Ninian as we have names of James Kincaid and Margaret Dalrumpell and there was no Robert. It is possible that he was born of a new wife after Margaret Dalrumpell died in October 1640. However, Robert being a son of Ninian is more probable. On the other hand, Captain Alexander Kinkead named his apparent first born son Robert and he was alive at the time of his Will in 1661. A bird in hand is better than two in the bush so an actual known Robert is better than any proposed son Robert for Ninian 3 Kinkead.

- The 1663 *Hearth Money Rolls for County Derry* records **Robert Kinkade** in Camsonairagh townland, Faughanvale parish.

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John Kinkead of Magheramore townland, Faughanvale parish

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Also in the 1663 Hearth Money Rolls for county Londonderry was John Kinkead of Magheramore townland, Faughanvale parish, county Londonderry. This townland is between Eglinton and Greysteel and southeast of the City of Derry Airport. Magheramore townland is in the middle of the parish and is bounded by Killylane on the south and west, by Cregan on the northwest, Tullybrisland on the northeast, and by Dungullion on the east. Given the close proximity to Campsey townland and the time period this really looks like a brother of Robert. This gives even greater support for the two being the first two sons of Captain Alexander Kinkead.

- The 1663 *Hearth Money Rolls for County Derry* records **John Kinkead** in Magheramory (i.e. Magheramore) townland, Faughanvale parish.

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Thomas Kinkead of Killdollah and Ballyrashane parish

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There is one more Kincaid recorded in the Hearth Money Rolls and that is of Thomas Kinkead of Killdollah and Ballyrashane parishes, county Londonderry. Ballyrashane parish is east of Coleraine parish. Killdollah parish lies on both of their southern border. Being of age he was born before 1642. Now Captain Alexander Kinkead, the apparent son of John Kincaid of Broughton and Helen Johnston, was the brother of Thomas Kincaid - John's oldest son and heir. Thomas Kincaid appears in Scottish records in 1604 when he was served heir to his uncle Robert Kincaid in annual rents of Craiglockhart. So he was presumably born before 1583. He got into financial trouble in 1610 and had to sell 57 acres of Broughton. Thomas Kincaid married Rachel Johnston on 6 August 1616 but died later that year on 13 December 1616. He left a pregnant wife for their son Thomas Kincaid was baptized in Edinburgh parish on 15 June 1617. Thomas Kincaid's Testament Dative and Inventar registered in the Edinburgh Commissary Court was given up by the said Rachel Johnston on behalf of the said infant Thomas Kincaid so Thomas left an heir. The young Thomas would have been 46 at the time of the Hearth Money Roll so it is possible he survived and settled next to his apparent uncle Captain Alexander Kinkead. Perhaps he was even raised by him. This seems the best suited candidate for Thomas Kinkead of Killdollah and Ballyrashane; albeit he could also be a son of one of the Limavady area Kincaids noted above.

- **Thomas, son of umquhile Thomas Kincaid, portioner of Broughtoun, and Rachell Johnstoun**, was baptized in Edinburgh parish, midlothian on 15 June 1617. The witnesses were Thomas Crychtoun, Johne Murray, and Thomas Fleming, and Thomas Kae with James Johnstoun.
- **Thomas Kincaid, son and heir of the deceased John Kincaid, portioner of Brochtounne**, had his testament dative and inventar registered in the Edinburgh Commissary Court on 30 January 1618. He died on the 13 December 1616. It was given up by **Rachall Johnstone, his relict**, in name and behalf of **Thomas Kincaid, lawful son** to the defunct, and as executor dative. He left an estate valued at £1088.1.8. with no debts. William Broun, merchant was cautioner.

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Post Glorious Revolution
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The Catholic king James II of England was replaced by William of Orange in 1688 sparking the Glorious Revolution. Ireland was the main battleground so it is no surprise we have a gap in records after 1663. However, after the revolution Kincaids emerge again in Londonderry records. The first was Margaret Kinkeade of Templemore parish, Londonderry who was born before 1676. Whose child she was is uncertain. She married Patrick Simson on 5 January 1692 so must have witnessed the horrors of the siege of Derry. Templemore parish includes part of the City of Londonderry but is predominately that portion of the county which is on the west side of the Foyle River. The townland of Elaghmore in Templemore parish borders on county Donegal and is adjacent to the townland of Dundrean, Burt parish, county Donegal. Glendermott parish includes that part of Londonderry on the east side of the Foyle River.

- The *Marriage registers of Derry Cathedral (St Columb's)*, parish of Templemore has the marriage by publication of **Patrick Simson** and **Margrett Kinkeade**, both of the parish by the Reverend Thomas Wallis, Deane of Derry, on 5 January 1692.

The problem going forward is that Scotland endured its great famine ('the seven ill years') in the later half of the 1690s. As a result there was another large influx of Scots into Ireland. Thus, without any specific document stating that one person is the child of another connections are reduced to speculation. The possibility of error is great. One really needs a multiple generation succession to a specific property to gain any comfort. So far that is lacking for our Kincaids in Londonderry.

The Londonderry Kincaids are of a particular interest to me. My own particular Kincaids left Londonderry for the Province of New Brunswick in Canada with the eldest arriving in August 1819, followed by brother David (my gg grandfather) arriving in May 1822, and younger brother George arriving a few years later. By then they considered

themselves Irish so more than one of the following would relate to my branch of Kincaids.

There are a few references to Kincaids on passenger lists for ships leaving the port of Londonderry. Unless stated we have no idea if they were residents of county Londonderry. They could have just as easily been from parts of counties Donegal and Tyrone.

One thing that is clear though from the records is that the scarcity of Kincaid references in county Londonderry in the early 1700s is that there were only a couple of Kincaid males in the county producing children in that period.

James Kinkead of Londonderry (bef 1687 -).

- **Discussion:** This James is likely too young to be of the the Hearth Money Roll Kinkeads.
- i. **Robert Kinkead** (bef 8 May 1705 -).
 - *Londonderry's Cathedral Church of St. Columb Registers* records that **Robert Kinkead**, son of **James and Mary Kinkead** was baptized on 8 May 1705.

Martha Kinkead of Londonderry (bef 1687 -).

- *Londonderry's Cathedral Church of St. Columb Registers* records that on 30 December 1703 **Martha Kinkead** was married there to **John Rankin**.
- **Discussion:** There is no indication given as to what family she belonged to but they were both of the parish of Templemore so she is probably connected to the previous Margaret Kinkead who married Patrick Simson.

Samuel Kinkead of Coleraine, county Londonderry (bef 1694 - aft 21 Jan 1715).

Witnessed by John Olpherts Thomas Adderton and **Samuel Kinkead**, all of the Town of Colerain. Memorial, dated 21 January 1715, witnessed by said **Samuel Kinkead** and Bernard Mulhollan. **Samuel Kinkead** gave the affidavit of execution [Ireland. Registry of Deeds. Vol. 14, p. 378, no. 6410; registered 13 June 1715].
 - **Discussion:** The Richard Jackson (1673-1730) here was apparantly the son of Capt. William Jackson and Susan Beresford and father of Richard Jackson of Forkhill, county Armagh (c1722-1787).

James Kinkaid, Esq., of Coleraine, county Londonderry (bef 1697 - bef 8 October 1737).

- **It is not certain** but it is assumed that he was the husband of Mary Kinkead, widow of Waterside whose son, William Kinkead, who figure prominently in Colerain in the mid 1700s. This James Kinkead as an Esquire fits as a prestigious enough person to have a family positioned to later do so well. We only have one record of him so far – when he became a Freeman of the Corporation of Coleraine on 9 October 1722. He would have been of full age, and likely over 25, so he was born before 1700. He may have been the above noted James Kinkead who with wife Mary had a son Robert baptized in Londonderry on 8 May 1705. Records show that he had sons Samuel and William and a daughter Elizabeth who married Andrew Todd of Shane's Castle, county Antrim. Samuel Kinkead was probably named after the previously noted Samuel Kinkead of Coleraine – perhaps the brother or father of James. Samuel served with General Rufane during the Seven Years War and died unmarried while stationed in the West Indies. William was a wine merchant and later became the Chamberlain of the Coleraine Corporation. Another son seems to have been Henry Kinkead who ended up in county Meath where he had a son John who was referred to in Samuel's Will.
- **James Kinkaid, Esq. of Coleraine**, was admitted or elected Freeman in the Corporation of Coleraine on 9 October 1722 [House of Commons Sessional Papers. Volume 36: 1831-1832. p. 3. Enhanced British Parliamentary Papers on Ireland, 1801-1922. 409: Return of Persons admitted or elected Freemen in Corporation of Coleraine, 1830-32].
- The following mortgage by **Mary Kinkead**, widow of Waterside, parish of Killowen, dated 8 October

1737, was witnessed by **William Kinkead**, vinter of Killowen, and **Elizabeth Kinkead**, spinster.

Vol. 125, p. 220-221, no. 84818; registered 20 December 1746].

- As regards written evidence, or Minutes of the Royal Arch. that of the Lodge at Fredericksburg, Va., dated December 22, 1752, was long considered the oldest in existence until 1910, when Bros. Powell and Littleton discovered a Minute of the Grand Committee of the G.L. of the "Antients," England, dated 2d September 1752 (Hist. of F.M. in Bristol, p. 640).

An earlier Minute referring to the R.A. has now been discovered in Ireland, dated April 16, 1752, of which a photographic reproduction is appended. This entry occurs in the Minute Book (No. 1) of Lodge No. 123, Coleraine, county Derry, Ireland, and reads:

"(1752) April 16th - At this Lodge Bror. Thos. Blair propos'd Samson Moore a Master & Roayl Arch Mason to be admitted a member of our Lodge."

The Warrant for No. 123, Coleraine, was granted by the G.L. of Ireland on May 8, 1741, to **Wm. Kinkead, gent.**, Alexr. McKachan, gent., & Domk. Heyland, gent. Sixty-three members were admitted between 1741 and 1780. The last Minute recorded is dated February 18, 1783 [Turnbull, Everett R. and Ray V. Denslow. A History of Royal Arch Masonry Part One. Kessinger Publishing, 2004. p. 154].

- **William Kinkaid, alderman of Coleraine**, was admitted or elected Freeman in the Corporation of Coleraine on 6 April 1747 [House of Commons Sessional Papers. Volume 36: 1831-1832. p. 4. Enhanced British Parliamentary Papers on Ireland, 1801-1922. 409: Return of Persons admitted or elected Freemen in Corporation of Coleraine, 1830-32].
- A Regiment of Foot arrayed in 1756, under the command of the Right Honourable Earl of Tyrone as Colonel, included a **Wm Kinkade** as an Ensign [Genealogical Office. Manuscript 608, Londonderry Militia lists 1756. "*A list of Officers in the Several Regiments & Independent Troops & Companies of Militia in Ireland; Taken from the Books in the Secretaries Offices, Dublin: Printed in the Year M.DCC.LXI.*"].
- The cemetery records for *Saint Patrick's Church of Ireland Cemetery, Coleraine parish* records that **William Kinkead** was buried in Plot No. F041; having died on 14 December 1765 at the apparent age of 55.
- William Kincaid is commemorated on a stained glass window in St. Patrick's Church, Coleraine. It reads as follows: // Near this place lieth the body of **William Kincaid** who in the 55th year of his age and in his usual vigour of health at a moment's warning was called out of this life the 14th December 1765. His character was uncommon, without the advantages of a learned education, his understanding was clear, solid and judicious. His conversation lively, entertaining and instructive. Without the advantages of a parental fortune, the ordinary fruits of a liberal industry furnished him the means of gratifying his generous disposition which was ever employed in acts of beneficence, kindness and compassion, these amiable and valuable qualities (grounded on inflexible integrity and a firm reliance on the promises of his Redeemer) were well known to the inhabitants of this

town who loved the man and lament his death. This stone was erected by Richard Jackson Esq in testimony of his affectionate regard [Transcribed by Marlene Rajan, Office Manager of St. Patrick's and St. Andrew's Church of Ireland, Coleraine, Northern Ireland, UK and forwarded to Peter A. Kincaid by email dated 3 July 2008].

- The *Belfast Newsletter* has entries relating to the estate of **William Kinkead**, wine merchant of Coleraine, in its issues dated 24 December 1765, 3 January 1766 and 11 March 1766. The first and second were creditors notices in which William is noted as deceased and the later relates to the auctioning of his estate by his administrator Andrew Todd of Shanescastle. Shane's Castle is in county Antrim between Randalstown and Antrim on Lough Neagh. Adjoining the grounds of Shane's Castle, is the demesne of Lord Massarene, with its mansion called Antrim Castle.
- Rev. Thomas H. Mullin's book *Coleraine in Georgian Times*, notes that William Kincaid appears in the records of Killowen in 1748 as a wine merchant to the Jackson family. Rev. Mullin also states that he died in 1768 and is commemorated in St. Patrick's Church in Coleraine. William Kinkead's estate was administered by Andrew Todd of Shane's Castle who was married to **Elizabeth Kinkead**. Rev. Mullin states that he had a son, William Kincaid, who was later chamberlain of Coleraine Corporation. Rev. Mullin seems to have made an error as to the year of William Kinkead's death [Information abstracted and emailed to Peter A. Kincaid on 13 June 1997 by Dan Wilson of Arizona State University (dan.wilson@asu.edu)].

ii. **Samuel Kinkead** (bef 1719 - bet 16 July 1762 & 21 April 1764).

- The *1740 list of Protestant Householders for County Derry* has one **Samuel Kinkead** in no. 338 Dunboe parish.
- A Regiment of Foot arrayed in 1756, under the command of the Right Hon. Hercules Langford Rowley as Colonel, included a **Samuel Kinkead** as an Ensign and a **Andrew Todd** as a Captain [Genealogical Office. Manuscript 608, Londonderry Militia lists 1756. "*A list of Officers in the Several Regiments & Independent Troops & Companies of Militia in Ireland; Taken from the Books in the Secretaries Offices, Dublin: Printed in the Year M.DCC.LXI.*"].
- The administration of the Will and Testament of Samuel Kinkead, Lieut. in 76th Regiment of Foot dated 16 July 1762 and registered on 21 April 1764 is as follows:

In the Name of God Amen. I **Samuel Kinkead**, Lieut[enant], in his Majesty's Seventy Sixth Regiment being sick and weak in body but of perfect Mind and Memory thanks be given unto God therefore calling unto mind the Mortality of my Body and knowing that it is appointed for all Men once to dye do make and ordain this my Last Will and Testament that is to say principally and first of all I give and recommend my Soul unto the hands of Almighty God that gave it and my body I recommend to the Earth to be buried in a Christian and decent manner nothing doubting but at the general Resurrection I shall receive the same again by the Mighty power of God. And as touching such Wordly Estate wherewith it hath pleased God to bless me in this Life I give devise and dispose of the same in the following manner and form. Imprimio after all my just debts and funeral Expenses is paid by my Executor hereafter named I Give and bequeath unto my loving **Brother William Kinkead** of Coleraine in the County of Derry and Kingdom of Ireland all my whole Estate both real and personal whatsoever, likewise all my wearing apparel pay and arrears of pay that is or shall become due or payable unto me from any agent or paymaster which is or shall be appointed to Majestys seventy sixth Regiment or any other person or person whatsoever or wheresoever but further my Will is that should my said Loving Brother William Kinkead be dead I then Will and bequeath all and every of my aforesaid Estate both Real and personal e[t] c[eter]a unto my Loving **Nephew John Kinkead** of Bellgeith in the County of Meath in the Kingdom of Ireland aforesaid and further my Will is that if my Loving Nephew John Kinkead should be dead I then give and bequeath unto my Loving Friend **Andrew Todd** Esquire of Shanes Castle in the County of Antrim in the Kingdom of Ireland all my Real and persoanl Estate as aforesaid and hereby by me directed and Willed I likewise Constitute and ordain my loving

Brother William Kinkead (if living) my Sole Executor of this my Last Will and Testament but if dead then and also I do hereby Nominate and appoint my **Loving Nephew John Kinkead** to be my Sole Executor in the Room and place of my Brother but if he should be dead likewise I then Nominate and appoint my aforesaid Trusty Friend Andrew Todd Esquire to be Sole Executor of this my Last Will and Testament. And I do hereby utterly disallow revoke and disannull all and every other former Wills and Testaments by me heretofore made confirming this and no other to be my Last Will and Testament. In Witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this sixteenth day of July one thousand seven hundred and sixty two. Samuel Kinkead, Lieut[enant] in the 76th Reg[imen]t.. Sealed signed published and declared by the said Samuel Kinkead to be his Last Will and Testament in presence of us who have by his request subscribed our Names as Witnesses hereunto. John Cope, Alex[ander] Grant , Cottrell Mercier.

On the twenty first day of April in the year of our Lord one thousand Seven hundred and Sixty Four Administration (with the Will annexed) of the Goods Chattels and Credits of Samuel Kinkead Esquire late Lieutenant in his Majesty's Seventy Sixth Regiment of Foot Commanded by General Rufane in parts beyond the seas a Batchelor deceased was granted to Robert Bigger the Lawful attorney of **William Kinkead the Brother and Sole Executor** named in said Will for the use and benefit of the **said Executor now residing at Coleraine** in the Kingdom of Ireland he having been first sworn duly to administer [United Kingdom. Public Record Office - National Archives. Prob 11/897 image 415].

- **Discussion:** Thus, clearly Samuel Kinkead and William Kinkead of Coleraine were brothers. Andrew Todd is likely a brother-in-law as according to Rev. Mullin he married Elizabeth Kinkead. The nephew John Kinkead of Bellgeith is indicative of him being a surviving son of William Kinkead of Coleraine or that there was another brother. It is likely that he was the son of a brother named Henry. Bellgeith is certainly the townland of Balgeeth. There are three townlands called Balgeeth in County Meath. However, this is certainly Balgeeth, Ardcath parish, Upper Duleek barony. Burke's Landed Gentry 1875 edition records on page 487 that John Garnett, Esq., of Balgeeth married Anne Hatch, daughter of Samuel Hatch, Esq., and had a daughter, Elizabeth, who married a **Kincaid** and a daughter Mary who married William Battersby, Esq. This corresponds with the marriage licenses issued in Dublin to **Henry Kinkead** and **Elizabeth Garnett** in 1739 and William Battersby, junr. and Mary Garnett in 1738 [House of Commons Sessional Papers. Volume 45: 1899-1899. p. 56. Enhanced British Parliamentary Papers on Ireland, 1801-1922. 9478: Deputy Keeper of Public Records in Ireland: thirty-first report Appendix I: Corrections to the Addenda to the Dublin Grants Index in Appendix to 26th Report]. These Garnetts occupied Athcarne Castle near Duleek village in this area. Elizabeth Garnett's sister, Mary, married William Battersby of Smithstown, and appears to have been the son of William Battersby of Clonabrany and Mary Sharman, daughter of Ambrose Sharman.
- **Discussion:** General William Rufane was Governor and Commander-in Chief at Martinique from February 1762 to July 1763. Thus, Samuel Kinkead served with General Rufane during the Seven Years War and died unmarried while stationed in the West Indies; probably sometime around 16 July 1762 as he was then sick in body.

iii. Elizabeth Kinkead (c1715 - 1750).

Andrew Todd erected this monument to the best of wives [Linenhall Library, Belfast, NI. Journal of the Association for the Preservation of the Memorials of the Dead in Ireland. Volume III, page 105. Latin inscription translated. As abstracted and forwarded to Peter A. Thomas Kinkeade, tailor of Londonderry (bef 1695 - c25 February 1715/16).

- *Londonderry's Cathedral Church of St. Columb Registers* records the burial of **Thomas Kinkeade**, tailor, on 25 February 1715/16.
- **Discussion:** Thomas must have been of age to be a tailor so he was born before 1695.

James Kinkead, mariner of Londonderry (bef 1700 -).

- The following is the administration of the Will and Testament of James Kinkead, mariner of Londonderry dated 17 November 1721 and registered on 8 November 1743.

In the Name of God Amen. I **James Kinkead** of Londonderry in the Kingdom of Ireland, Mariner being in Bodily health and of sound and disposing Mind and Memory and considering the perils and dangers of the seas and other uncertaintys of this transitory Life Do for avoiding controversys after my decease make publish and declare this my last Will and Testament in manner following. That is to say First I recommend my soul to God that gave it and my Body I commit to the Earth or sea as it shall please God to order. And as for and concerning all my wordly Estate I give bequeath and dispose thereof as followeth. That is to say all such debts wages sum and sums of Money, Lands Tenements Goods Chattels and Estate whatsoever as shall be anyways due oweing or belonging unto me at the time of my decease I do give devise and bequeath the same unto my beloved wife **Jane Kinkead** of the same place and I do hereby nominate and appoint my said wife sole executrix of this my last Will and Testament hereby revoking all former and other Wills Testaments and Deeds of Gift by me at any time heretofore made. And I do ordain and ratify these presents to stand and be for and as my only last Will and Testament. In witness whereof to this my said Will I have set my hand and seal the seventeenth day of November Anno Dom[ini] 1721 and in the eighth year of the Reign of his Majesty King George over Great Britain [et] [ce]t[era]. James Kinkead. Signed sealed and published in the presense of us Edmund Pryce, Jo[hn] Robins[on], Tho[mas] Sayer.

On the eighth day of November in the year of our Lord one Thousand seven hundred and Forty three Administration (with the Will annexed) of the Goods Chattels and Credits of James Kinkead late of Londonderry in the Kingdom of Ireland but on board the East India Ship the Drake deceased was granted to Charles Robinson the lawful attorney of Jane Kinkead widow the Relict of the deceased and sole Executrix named in said Will for the use and benefit of the said Executrix now residing in Londonderry aforesaid being first sworn duly to administer [United Kingdom. Public Record Office - National Archives. Prob 11/730 image 58].

- **Discussion:** James clearly died on board the East India Ship called 'the Drake' sometime a bit prior to the registration date of 8 November 1743. This would place him on board the East India Company ship of that name which was a regular ship of 490 tons in their service from 1739-1744. It sailed 2 voyages for the company [East India Company Ships. Ship Drake, ID 1413. <http://www.eicships.info/ships/shipdetail.asp?sid=1413>].

Robert Kincaid, sailor of Londonderry (bef 1705 -).

- **Robert Kincaid** of Londonderry, sailor, appears in the *Burial registers for Malew, Isle of Man* under the date of 15 September 1719.

John Kinkead of Aghansillagh, Balteagh parish, county Londonderry (bef 1711 -)

- **John Kinkead** and his wife **Jane Noble**, conveyed their lease of part of the lands of **Ballynahery, Drumachose parish** to one Robert Scott on 10 April 1732 as follows (excepting the portion in italics which was in Latin):

{In left-hand margin} No. 62733. Kinkead et ux to Scott. Reg[istere]d the 31st day of Jan.y 1737 at 3 a Clock in the after noon.

{Regular text} To the Reg[istra]r appointed by Act of Parl[iamen]t for reg[isterin]g of Deeds Conveyances & Wills &c.// A Memorial of a Conveyance of a Lease dated the Tenth day of April in the Year of our Lord God one thous[an]d seven hundred & thirty two Whereby **Jo[h]n Kinkead & Jane Kinkead al[ia]s Noble** his wife both of Aghansallagh in the Co[unty] of Londonderry did for & in cons[ide]r[ation] of the sum of sixteen pounds ster[ling] to the said Jo[h]n Kinkead in hand paid by Rob[er]t Scott of little Dairey in s[ai]d Co[unty] Farmer convey & make over unto the s[ai]d Rob[er]t Scott his Heirs & Ass[igne]es All that whole third p[ar]t of the holding called Ballynahairy as then in the poss[ess]ion of Ja[me]s Martin tog[ether] with all the Houses Gardens Tenem[en]ts & other the appur[tenance]s thereunto belong[in]g for & during the full Term & Time then to Come of the grand Lease which the s[ai]d Jo[h]n Kinkead held by right of his wife Jane Kinkead al[ia]s Noble under the R[ig]ht Hon[our]able Lord Visc[oun]t Tyrone He the s[ai]d Rob[er]t Scott yielding & paying yearly & every year during the s[ai]d grand Demise the sum of one pound Eleven shill[ing]s & seven pence ster[ling] tog[ether] with all [prof]utts Tythes Dutys & Customs [tha]t might happen thereon. The said Bargain to begin & Comence from the first day of Nov[embe]r then next before the Date of s[ai]d Conveyance so made by the s[ai]d Jo[h]n Kinkead & Jane his wife which s[ai]d Conveyance is Witnessed by Mathew Scott of little Dairy W[illia]m Scott of Largy & Hugh Forsyth then of Newtown Limavaddy all in the County of Londonderry & this Mem[oria]l is witnessed by the s[ai]d Mathew Scott & W[illia]m Church of Colrain in s[ai]d Co[unty] Merch[an]t. ~ Rob[er]t (his mark) Scott (seal) signed & sealed in p[re]sence of us ~ Math[ew] Scott ~ Will Church. The above named Mathew Scott came this day before us & made oath that he saw the above named Jo[h]n Kinkead & Jane Kinkead al[ia]s Noble sign & seal the s[ai]d Conveyance above ment[ione]d & [tha]t he also saw the said Rob[er]t Scott sign seal & Execute the above Mem[oria]l & [tha]t the Name Mathew Scott subscr[ibe]d as Witness to the s[ai]d Conveyance is this Dep[onden]ts proper hand writing. Mathew Scott ~ [Sworn at Langmore in County Londonderry 24th day January 1737 before me a Commissioner & Court secretary for County Londonderry in presence of Cha[rle]s Church Griff[ith] Howard May[o]r of Colrain & Arth[u]r Church Just[ice] of [th]e peace for the Co[unty] Londonderry. [Northern Ireland. Registry of Deeds. Kinkead et ux to Scott, no. 62733, book 89, page 178].

- **Discussion:** Ballynahery is on the east side of Drumsurn road in Drumachose parish. It lies on a north west to south east slant. It is partly on the north side of Glebe, Ardmore, and Drumgesh townlands. On its west is Drummond townland. On its north is Drummond, Glenkeen and Ruskey townland (to the immediate east of Ruskey is Tirmaquin townland). On its east is Ballyavelin North townland. There was an old church to its west in Drummond townland. The Viscount Tyrone was Marcus Beresford (1694-1763), later 1st Earl of Tyrone, son of Sir Tristram Beresford, and Nichola Sophia Hamilton, daughter of Hugh Hamilton, 1st baron of Glenawly. Aghansillagh is on the east side of Drumsurn road a little further south in Balteagh parish. On its north side is Little Derry townland. The northwest tip of Little Derry townland bounds the southeast time of Ardmore townland. On its east side is parish line with Tibaran and Freugh townlands (both in Errigal parish). On its south side is Gortnarney and Temain townlands. On its west side is Drumagosker and Lislane townlands. Lislane townland contained a Presbyterian Meeting House. As a matter of perspective, Ballykelly is within 3 miles west of Limavady while Aghansillagh is within 3 miles south east of Limavady. Dungiven is about 8.5 miles south of Limavady. This John Kinkead seems the most likely Kincaid to descend from one of the earlier Kincaids of the Limavady area.

Isabel Kinkead of Drumachose parish, county Londonderry (bef 1712 -).

- The register book of the parish of Drumachose for 1728 records the marriage in November of **John Beard** and **Isabel Kinkead** [Public Record Office of Northern Ireland. MIC/583/1: Drumachose Church of Ireland (Christchurch), Marriages 1728-1753].

George Kincaid of Newtown-Limavady, Tamlaght Finlagan parish, county Londonderry (bef 1719 -).

- The 1740 list of Protestant Householders for County Derry has **George Concade** in Newton (Limavady).

John Kinkead of Londonderry (bef 1744 -).

- The *St. Columb's Church of Ireland Cathedral Registers* records the marriage of **John Kinkead** and **Anne Hammond** on 30 September 1762 by Rev. Richard Waddy.
 - **Discussion:** There is nothing to indicate his place of abode. However, the following indicates that the minister was rector of Cumber parish. This indicates he was of that parish or an adjacent one. Hammonds came over to Canada around the same time as my gg grandfather and settled on a lot closeby so this has always been an interesting couple to me. Hammonds were pretty scarce in the vicinity of Londonderry with known ones being Richard Hammon of Mullaboy, Cumber parish; Alexander Hamond of Waterside, Glendermot parish; and William Hamond of Londonderry, Templemore parish. An interesting note is that here was an Alexander Glenn in Mullaboy townland, Cumber parish in 1740. As will be shown below Mary Kincaid married David Glenn of Kildoag, Lower Cumber parish and had a daughter Mary baptized in 1810 and a son David baptized in 1812.

James Kincade of Ballimoney townland, Bovevagh parish, county Londonderry (bef 1745 -).

- The 1766 *Religious Census for County Derry* one **James Kincade** of Ballimoney townland, Bovevagh parish, as a member of the Church of Ireland.
 - Other persons listed in the *1766 Religious Census of Ballimoney townland , Bovevagh parish, county Londonderry* were: William Anderson, Samuel Blair, Thomas Blair, Dennis Brolly, Henry Brolly, James Brolly, David Calhoun, John Calhoun, Thomas Carlan, James Donaghy, Thomas Donelan, Robert Gwin, Thomas Gwin, Ever McClosky, Hugh McClosky, Patrick McClosky, Paul McClosky, Ardel McLaughlin, Bryan McLaughlin, Owen McNichol, Patrick McNichol, Edmund McPhillipeene, Hugh Miller, Laurence O'Brolly, Donaghy O'Cahan, Michael O'Cahan, Owen O'Cahan, William O'Cahan, Patrick O'Cahane, Michael O'Donaghy, Patrick O'Donaghy, Shane O'Donnellan, and Roger O'Hassan.
 - **Discussion:** Ballymoney townland is on the southwest border of the parish and sits to the west of Dungiven; being about half-way between Dungiven and Claudy on the north side of the Foreglen Road. It is bounded on the east by Ballyharigan townland, the north by Drum townland, on the south by Feeny and Ovil townlands; and on the west by Farkland and Muldonagh townlands.

John Kinkaid of Ballycallaghan, Cumber Upper parish, county Londonderry (bef 1753 -).

- The Freeholder's register for the parish of Upper Cumber lists one **John Kinkaid** of Billykilligan in 1774 [Rutherford, Rev. John. *Cumber Presbyterian Church and Parish*. 1939].
- **Discussion:** This could be the above noted John Kinkead who married Ann Hammond. Ballykilligan is certainly Ballycallaghan, Cumber Upper parish in 1762. Cumber Upper and Cumber Lower parishes lie adjacent to each other on a northwest-southeast axis with Cumber Lower being the most northerly. The only other persons given in the same source as being in Ballycallaghan in 1774 was John Lighton. However, the same source gives the following there in the 1740 Protestant Household lists: Lesly Brown, John Leighton, Alex. Moore, Sam Ellis, Jas. McDonnell, and Thos. Bann (i.e. Bond).

William Kinkaid of Ballynashallog, Templemore parish, county Londonderry (bef 1762 -).

- The 1783 cess lists for Ballynasallough (Ballynashallog), Templemore parish, county Londonderry included William Porter, Mr Wray, James Hatrick, John Scott and **William Kinkad** [PRONI, MIC1/19/1. Parish of Templemore, Diocese Derry, Co. Londonderry: List of Cess-payers, 1775-1784. As abstracted by Robert Forrest (14 Edenvale, Crossgar, Downpatrick, Northern Ireland, BT309PU; bobbyforrest63@hotmail.com) and forwarded to Peter A. Kincaid by email dated 6 July 2019].
- **Discussion:** The principal estate in Ballynashallog was Brook Hall. This was previously held by Andrew McIlwaine who married Lucy Noble about 27 September 1746. He got it from Thomas Crofts who got it from George Gregory and Rebecca Houston. This ties in with John Kinkead of Aghansillagh, Balteagh parish, county Londonderry who with his wife Jane Noble conveyed their lease of part of the lands of Ballynahery, Drumachose parish to one Robert Scott on 10 April 1732 (see above). Shortly thereafter, in 1734 a marriage licence bond was made for the marriage of John Kinkead and Elizabeth McIlwaine in the diocese of Raphoe. The Andrew McIlwaine of Londonderry who married Lucy Noble was a sheriff of Londonderry in 1721, 1727, 1734 and 1740. One William Noble was sheriff of Londonderry in 1670. Furthermore, John Kincade and Jane Houston were married in Londonderry on 3 June 1782 (see below). The Houstons were also long time sheriffs of Londonderry. Robert Houston was sheriff of Londonderry in 1675; Robert Houston was sheriff of Londonderry in 1710, and 1729; Edward Houston was sheriff of Londonderry in 1730; and Robert Houston was sheriff of Londonderry in 1756. Edward Houston's wife was Rebecca. See my paper 'Kincaids of Taughboyne parish, county Donegal' for details and further discussion
 - On 8 October 1738, **Rebecca Houston**, of the City of Londonderry, widow of the **deceased Edward Houston** of the City of Londonderry, conveyed to Henry White of the City of Londonderry, Gentleman, lands granted to her and her husband for the lives of 1) **Robert Houston junior, only son of Robert Houston of the City of Londonderry**; 2) Frederick Conningham, only son of John Knox of the City of Londonderry, eldest son of Alexander Knox of the City of Londonderry, merchant and 3) the said Alexander Knox of the City of Londonderry, merchant. Witnesses to the Deed & Memorial were Mathew Leeson of the City of Londonderry, Gentleman; and Henry Dent of the City of Londonderry, clerk to Mathew Leeson. Sworn before

Edward Houston of the City of Dublin, Gentleman, Commisioner of Oaths. Registration witnessed by George Tomkins of the City of Londonderry, Justice of the Peace; and Peter Stanly of the City of Londonderry, Justice of the Peace. Reference to James Wilson of the City of Londonderry and widow Squires of the City of Londonderry [Northern Ireland. Registry of Deeds. Volume 92, page 342, no. 64846; registered on 13 November 1738].

- 27 September 1746. **Andrew Makilvaine of the City of Londonderry, Esq.**, of the 1st part; Abraham Croker of Balenety, County Limerick, Gent., and Henry Sloan of the City of Londonderry, of the 2nd part; and **Lucey Noble of Derrygree, County Fermanagh, singlewoman**, of the 3rd part. Marriage to be shortly solemnized between **Andrew Makilvaine and Lucey Noble**. John Kincade of Londonderry (bef 1764 -).

- The *St. Columb's Church of Ireland Cathedral Registers* records the marriage of **John Kincade** and **Jane Houston** on 3 June 1782 by Rev. Pitt Kennedy. There is nothing to indicate his place of abode.
 - **Discussion:** Rev John Pitt Kennedy was ordained April 1781 and was Chaplain or Curate in St Augustine's Derry 1782-1791 [Leslie, Clergyof Derry & Raphoe, p. 116]. Rev. Pitt Kennedy was incumbent of Donagh, Inishowen barony in 1806 [Carlisle, Nicholas. A topographical dictionary of Ireland. London: William Savage, 1810]. This would be Rev. John Pitt Kennedy who was rector of Donagh and afterward rector of Balteagh, county Londonderry. He married Mary Carey, only child of Major Thomas Carey of Loughash, Donaghedy parish, county Tyrone and his son William Pitt Kennedy became of Loughash. This suggests that this relates to the John Kincaid who was of nearby Ballycallaghan in 1774.
- **Discussion:** As noted above, Houstons were in the immediate vicinity of Londonderry. Of particular interest are the following references.

- Robert Houston, Upperargrayhound {i.e. Ardground}, Cumber parish, Tirkeeran Barony [Public Record Office of Northern Ireland (PRONI), Belfast, Northern Ireland. T808/1528, 1740 Protestant Householder's Returns].
- James Houston, Edenreagh Beg, Clondermot parish [Public Record Office of Northern Ireland (PRONI), Belfast, Northern Ireland. T808/1528, 1740 Protestant Householder's Returns]. This townland is to the east of Londonderry on the east side of Gortnessy townland.
- On 27 April 1775, William Leckey Esq., Rebecca Houston, widow, Robert Houston, merchant, and Sarah Houston, spinster, conveyed to James Alexander Esq. their leasehold interest in land near the City of Londonderry for consideration of £669.14.1½. and rent of £6.3.2½ [Public Record Office of Northern Ireland (PRONI), Belfast, Northern Ireland. D2433/A/1/46/4].
- Robert Houstoun, Londonderry City, county Londonderry, religion - Established Church [Public Record Office of Northern Ireland (PRONI), Belfast, Northern Ireland. T808/15307, 1775 Dissenters' petitions].

Robert Kinkead, of Killea parish, county Donegal (bef 1769 -).

- **Discussion:** While this is in county Donegal it is just outside the city limits and less than 4 miles from the Walls of Derry and St. Columb's Cathedral. There was a William, son of Robert and Sarah Kinkead baptized at St. Columb's on 26 May 1793. His parents fit very well as the Robert Kinkead and Sara McBeth of Killea parish who were married on 28 April 1787. This William fits as the William Kinkaid, barber, who died at the Londonderry Workhouse on 21 July 1865 at the age of 76. If not him, then another possible candidate for the son of Robert and Sara is William Kincaid of county Londonderry who emigrated to Adelaide township, Middlesex county, Ontario, Canada in the 1840s. Killea parish is on the north side of Taughboyne parish and east side of All Saints parish. Carrigans & Kildrum lower townlands on the south side of the parish are on the east side of Tonagh townland, Taughboyne parish which has Greenhill (former home of the Elaghmore, Londonderry Kincaids. Monreagh townland is on the northwest side of said Greenhill. Robert Kinkead was born before 1769 at the latest – working on being 18 when he married Sara McBeth.
 - 28 April 1787. **Robert Kinkead** and **Sara McBeth** both of Killea? parish Protestants md by licence [Marriages in the Raphoe Church of Ireland registers (PRONI, MIC/1/95/1) as abstracted by Robert Forrest (14 Edenvale, Crossgar, Downpatrick, Northern Ireland, BT309PU; bobbyforrest63@hotmail.com) and forwarded to Peter A. Kincaid by email dated 29 December 2009]. Not certain if this applies but placed here for reference.
- i. **William Kinkead** (bef 1789 -).
- The *St. Columb's Church of Ireland Cathedral Registers* records the baptism of **William**, son of **Robert and Sarah Kinkead**, on 26 May 1793.
 - The *24th Report of the Inspectors-General on the General State of the Prisons of Ireland 1845* for County of Londonderry Gaol has, on page 290, has a **William Kincaid** holding the office of Barber with a salary of 4 15s. The local Inspector was Alexander Skipton [PP 1846 Vol XX].
 - The Civil Registration of Deaths records that **William Kinkaid** died in the Workhouse on 21 July 1865. He was a 76 year old widower barber who died of consumption which he had for 10 months. The informant was William Rogers, Master of Workhouse, Derry [Ireland. Civil Registrations of Deaths. Londonderry District, no. 12, volume 12, page 134].

John Kincaid of Londonderry (bef 1778 -).

- In the December 1796 lists of Yeoman Cavalry for county Londonderry is recorded one Private **Jno Kincaid** under Captain G. F. Hill, Londonderry [Public Record Office of Northern Ireland. T/1021/3. County Derry Muster rolls, 1796-1804].
 - **Discussion:** Sir George Fitzgerald Hill (1 Jun 1763 - 8 Mar 1839) was the eldest son of Sir Hugh Hill who represented the city of Londonderry in the Irish Parliament from 1768 to 1795. Sir George represented the borough of Coleraine in Parliament from 1791 until 1795 when he succeeded his father as member of Parliament for the City of Londonderry. This suggests that John Kincaid was from the City of Londonderry.

Mary Kincaid (c1779 - c24 Dec 1859) of Kildoag, Lower Cumber parish, county Londonderry.

John Kincaid of Elaghmore townland, Templemore parish, county Londonderry (bef 1782 -).

- **Discussion:** John Kincaid of Elaghmore was perhaps the same person as as John Kincaid of Dundrean, Burt parish, county Donegal - the adjacent townland.
- On 26 February 1803, Thomas Preston of Elagh More, Co. Londonderry, gave a lease to **John Kincaid** of Greenhills, Co. Donegal, for 12 acres and 21 perches in Elagh More, Co. Londonderry, paying a rent of £20 9s 6d for the term of 21 years [Public Record Office of Northern Ireland. D4174/A/3].
 - **Discussion:** Today Greenhill is a 100 acre townland in Aghanunshin parish and a 8 acre townland in Stranorlar parish. However, there is also a Greenhill that is part of Tonagh townland in Taughboyne parish. This is the likely place he was from. Since he was acquiring a leasehold interest it is assumed that he was at least 21 years old and thus born before 1782.
- The *Tithe Composition Applotment Books* for county Londonderry records that in 1826 one **John Kincaid** held 12 acres 17 roods 7 perches for a tithe of £1/0/8½ in Elaghmore townland, Templemore parish [Provincial Archives of New Brunswick. Richard Kincaid (bef 1786 -).

Total dna in common with Olivia amounts to 58.3 cM with a couple of respectable segments of 9.4 cM and 6.5 cM long which is quite significant for a couple of hundred years of separation (the time since Kincaids have been in Canada).

- **Discussion**: Elizabeth Kincade of Toneduff, Lower Cumber parish was the head of a household of 6 females – all Presbyterian. There were no Kincaids as heads of the household in Toneduff townland in the Tithe records just a few years earlier. The townland of Toneduff, Cumber Lower parish is along the road from Dunnamanagh (the principal town of Doneghedy parish) to Claudy in Londonderry and is only three of four miles from Dunnamanagh. On the way to Dunnamanagh one would pass through the townlands of Ardground, Kildoag, and Lackagh in Cumber Lower parish then Leitrim, Bunowen, and Creaghan Glebe in Donaghedy parish, county Tyrone. At different points in time there were Kincaids in 4 out of 6 of these townlands. The division line between Cumber Lower parish and Cumber Upper parish follows closely this road (following Bonds Glen) so one would probably pass through the townlands of Glenlough, Gortnaskey, Ballycallaghan, and Rasperry Hill on the way to Dunnamanagh.

 - **Discussion**: It is assumed that the reference to him being a Babington was that he was a supporter of the Reform Bill of 1832 advocated by Whig politician Thomas Babington, Lord Macaulay for democratic reform to elections to the House of Commons.

William Kincade (c1812 -).

- Isabella Kincade, age 22; James Kincade, age 20; and Mary Kincade, age 25, were listed consecutively as passengers on the *Brig Czar* which sailed from Londonderry to Philadelphia on 29 August 1839. Also listed consecutively later in the roll as passengers were **Sally Kincade**, age 20; and **William Kincade**, age 27.

Elizabeth Kinkaid of 19 Fahan Street, Londonderry (c1816 -).

- **Discussion:** She could have been 1) Elizabeth McCrum, wife of William Kincaid, formerly of Waterloo Place; 2) Eliza Shiels, wife of Henry Kincaid (see below for more on both men); or 3) Elizabeth Rankine, wife of John Kinkade of Londonderry. Presumably she was of the latter as William Kincaid and Henry Kincaid were Presbyterians.
- **Elizabeth Kincaid** died at 19 Fahan St., Derry on 21 April 1868. She was a 52 year old Dealer's Widow who died of disordered stomach of 17 months (uncertified, no medical attendance) which she had for 17 months. The school curriculum was to include "Greek, Latin, French, Algebra and Euclid", and **Mr. Kincaid** was to have two assistants, one at a salary of £80 per annum and the other with a salary of £20 per annum. Day-Pupils' fees ranged from 50p-£1 per term, and boarders paid between £60 and £100 per annum. The Salters' Company and **Mr Kincaid** had a vision for a first class intermediate or, as we would now say, Grammar School. Neither the Rector nor the Primate shared this view, and saw the school's raison d'être as being elementary education for the sons of the 'lower classes'. The tension that these opposing views gave rise to undoubtedly weakened the ability of **Mr Kincaid** to develop the school as he should. Shortly after his appointment more than 50 boys were enrolled, by 1894 numbers had fallen to twelve. From 1886 until 1894 there was a battle royal between the Presbyterian Church and Church of Ireland over control of The Rainey. The former claimed that the school had been founded by a Presbyterian elder who did not wish it to be a 'denominational school'. The Anglicans argued that the Act of Parliament of 1738 and the tradition of the past century gave them a claim to the school. In addition Catholics claimed that Hugh Rainey had not specified any denominational interest in his will and that therefore they also had a claim. At one stage it seemed that the school might not survive this denominational wrangling. However in 1894 the Rainey was finally established as an inter-denominational school for Intermediate or Higher Grammar School education. In 1894 **Mr. Kincaid** retired and Mr.

McFeeters was appointed as Headmaster [History of Rainey Endowed School, Magherafelt. www.rainey-endowed.schoolzone.co.uk/schoolhistory.htm].

Kincaid - Ont he 13th inst., at his late residence, 146 Burrows Ave., Robert Kincaid, aged 65 years, native of Londonderry, Ireland, and was a member of the Orange order for the past 40 years. Funeral service will be held at the above address Wednesday, the 15th. inst., at 2 p.m. Interment in

Elmwood cemetery. Friends will kindly accept this the only intimation.

All they had noted was a date of 14 October 1910 and that the newspaper was called the Free Press. I was able to determine that this Elmwood cemetery and Burrows Avenue was in Winnipeg, Manitoba which has a newspaper called the Winnipeg Free Press. However, Robert died on 13 October 1919 not 1910.

- The death records for the Province of Manitoba, Manitoba records **Robert Kincaid** died at home on 13 October 1919 from angina pectoris. Robert Kincaid was a 62 year old white male of 146 Burrows Avenue, Winnipeg. He was a married labourer born in Londonderry, Ireland having been in Manitoba for 5 years. He was buried in Elmwood cemetery. The informant for his death was his son **James Kincaid** of 146 Burrows Avenue, Winnipeg. Manitoba Free Press. Winnipeg, MB. Vol. 48, no. 244. Saturday, 22 July 1922. p. 7, col. 2; Vol. 48, no. 243. Friday, 21 July 1922. p. 17, col. 3]. - When **Kitty Kinkaid** speaks lovingly about the bread her mother baked on an open hearth in a thatched cottage in county Derry, Ireland, more than 80 years ago, she still remembers how good it tasted with fresh farm butter.// At 82, Kinkaid recalls that her mother baked "the best scones in the world on a griddle hung over the fire. And her oaten bread, baked against the hearth turf, was so firm and crunchy."// A resident of St. Patrick's Home on Riverside Dr., for the last 10 years, Kinkaid claims long hours of hard work from the

age of 13 until she was almost 70 gave her a strong constitution. "I have arthritis, and don't walk we now," she admits. "But I've never been a whiner. I survived."// One of three sets of twins in a farm family of nine, Kinkaid remembers eating "lots of potatoes, always boiled with their jackets on, and the water saved to mix with the feed for the cattle."// Candy and cake was virtually unknown to Kinkaid, who worked at a neighbor's as a farm hand and maid at 15. (She came to Canada in 1925 when she was 23.)// "Fresh dulse, so salty and dry, that was our candy. Mother bought it in a bag in the village every July," she smiles. [Gillies, Marjorie.
